Among other changes brought by the new official year is that Egon has passed on the management of "THE NEWS". The Club's gratitude is due to him for establishing and developing this important side of our activities, so before going further we would like to thank him for his enthusiastic work.

AT OUR ANNUAL CENERAL MEETING

on February 17th there was an interested and lively gathering of about 75, and many points of interest were brought before members. The President again stressed the need for new leaders, and commented on the disappointing show of interest in instruction for leaders during 1949. The Club is now able to do more than just walk - there should be allied activities such as botany, geology and photography, and particularly mapping. Everyone can add information to existing maps and track notes and help to explore new areas. He also exhorted members to take adequte safety precautions on walking trips for the protection of themselves and others, and for Thheheeputation of the Press in walking was mentioned. This can be of value in fostering organized walking, but, to avoid wrong impressions, only official information should be given the Press. There were about 45 new members (including many from overseas)out of 1949's total membership of about 120. There was a great number and variety of walks plenty of social activity, and the Club was always well represented at Federation functions.

During general discussion of various matters it was good to find so many voicing their ideas. The old question of non-active membership was vigorously debated, and finally settled. (See Constitution). The proposal to raise subscriptions for the coming year was strongly supported by many, but after considerable debate was dereated on the vote.
