ALONG THE TRACK

Easter provided fair weather for our two trips, although Warren Olle's party was delayed by heavy mist, and had to have a dry camp. Next day, however, they had a very extensive view from Mt. Federation. Owing to previous bush-fire damage, much of the track is overgrown, and there is quite a bit of scrub-bashing and clambering over fallen trees. On Sunday, five left the main party, under deputy-leadership of Frank Burt, and attempted to climb Mt. Torbrech, but were foiled by the scrub and the blistered heels of one of them. The other seven followed the Snob's Creek Road, in steady rain, but dried out in a comfortable hut - with electric light!

There were twelve in Mario Jusczyk's Grampians party, and although time available was cut down by unsatisfactory transport facilities the trip was most enjoyable. One day was spent visiting Mt.William, 3829'. The track is well-cut and graded and presents a much easier access than Major Mitchell must have had when he visited and named the peak in 1836. Fine views of the extremely rugged ranges and contrasting plains beyond were to be had on the way up, but low-hanging cloud obscured the view from the top (and nearly froze the visitors!)
