ELTHAM - RINGWOOD - JOHN BALL: A party of nine turned up for my walk through pleasant country along the Yarra to Warrandyte, where a "wet lunch" was enjoyed. All were glad to reach Ringwood at 6 o'clock.

To started off along cleared ridges where we had to dig our studs in to stop the wind blowing us away, and were quite glad when we got into the scrubby country typical of the area. It rained quite a lot on Saturday - we were in a somewhat incongruous position, having a "dry" lunch in pouring rain! Fortunately near Mt. Robertson we found a gold-digger's hut, into which nine fitted tightly but warmly for the night. We lost three members, but found them next day in good condition. Reaching the van was a very velcome moment, even though the trip back was a cold one.
