FEDERATION DAY WALK : Sunday 21st September

Next Sunday the Annual Federation Day Walk takes place. This year it is being led by the Melbourne Walking Club, and the route is Upper Ferntree Gully - Mt Morton - Belgrave, a distance of 9 miles. BEACONSFIELD - STONY CREEK - CLEMATIS - ALF COLE - 2nd/3rd August.
Only three turned up for this walk in beautiful weather. We headed for the Reservoir across country, but missed the turn-off from O'Neill's Rd. This forced us to have a dry lunch. We continued to North Beaconsfield along O'Neill's Rd, a pleasant bush track. When we crossed Stony Creek, the only good camp-site appeared to be in a farm paddock. Upon asking permission to camp, we found it was the bull paddock, and hastily evacuated. We camped opposite the farm on the hill. The farmer was kindly disposed, allowing us to use his tanks, and stayed to chat for some time. Next day we made across country to the Emerald Road, then cut across the hills to Bald Hill, having lunch in a pleasant gully en route. After a warm siesta we "scrub-bashed" to Clematis, then relaxed until we caught the bus home.

KALLISTA - MONBULK - OLINDA - KALLISTA - RON EATON - 3rd August.

Twenty-two starters set out in mild weather for Beagley's Bridge, where we followed the creek until we reached Monbulk. After lunch in a small clearing, we followed a bush track to Burke Road, then along McCarthy Road and Perrins Road, and so back to Kallista through fine bush country.

DANDENONG - LYSTERFIELD - BELGRAVE - DON SMELLIE - 10th August.

This walk drew twenty-one members, who went from Dandenong direct to Heaney Park, where we stopped for lunch, making tea the lazy way with a 6d billy of hot water from the kiosk. The weather was ideal and the view from the top of the Lysterfields excellent. A dead cow upset our scent of direction, and we ended up at Ferntree Gully instead of Belgrave after an enjoyable day. Some members complained of lack of excitement on this walk since the nudist colony at Heaney Park has been closed.

LILYDALE - GLENNON'S HILL - HURSTBRIDGE - TINE KOETSIER - 16/17th August

The leader reports that of the seven on the walk only two could sing in tune. We caught the midday train on Saturday to Lilydale, and walked north to the cemetery, then across country to the Yarra and the Hill bridge. We had several good views of Yering Gorge as we went north. We came out on a road and followed it to where the Maroondah Aqueduct disappears in a tunnel, camping at 4.30 pm. The weather was perfect, and the wattle in full bloom. On the Sunday we started at 9 am up a steep track, where we missed a road going north. After crossing a lightly timbered saddle and skirting Little Sugarloaf we got back to the right road. Later we turned left, passed a monument, and came to a junction.

We crossed the almost dry Watson's Creek, then proceeded gradually uphill to One Tree Hill. We had a dry lunch on top, traversed a couple of properties not marked on the map, where we had some explaining to do, and continued at a great pace to Glennon's Hill (apparently known locally as Windy Ridge). We went S.W. to Fenton Hill and Hurstbridge, via Cherry Tree Gully. We met Lloyd Reynolds' party at the Hurstbridge station.

HURSTBRIDGE - ARTHUR'S CREEK - HURSTBRIDGE - LLOYD RLYNOLDS - 17th August
We had an enjoyable walk on a perfect day. The hares led the tortoises (and the leader!) part of the way, but we eventually reached our destination. By mutual arrangement, we met the week-enders led by Tine, and returned together in the train.

ROMSEY - CHEROKEE - BARRINGO PARK - LORRAINE RICHEY - 24th August.

In spite of bad weather, this turned out to be an interesting trip for the twenty-six present. We started walking in dull weather at Brock's Monument, from where we obtained a clear view of Mt Diogenes (the Hanging Rock), but the nearby Mt Macedon and Camel's Hump were shrouded in mist. We turned south just past Hesketh, and soon after the road petered out into a foot pad, we stopped for lunch at a spring. We had hardly started again when it suddenly began to snow, and our packs and caps soon became covered in a thick layer. We dropped down to Cherokee, where there was less snow, but where it was spread out more evenly on the cleared fields. We followed a disused track along the Barrings Creek, until we came to the van at the Barrings Park picnic grounds. We stopped at Gisborne for refreshments on the way home.

CROYDON - WONGA PARK - MITHAM - EARL LAVENDER - 31st August.

The leader reports that thirteen members were present. The area is no longer suitable for walking, owing to the number of buildings.

THE YOU YANGS - REX BENN - 7th September.

A full van of thirty six proceeded to a point on the Geelong/Bacchus Marsh Road, approximately W.N.W. of the You Yangs. Someone had said there was no water, and one member brought a tank full in his pack, but we followed creeks for the next four miles, passing a full dam. We stopped beside one stream, in a pleasant glade, where there was plenty of clean running water and dry brittle firewood.

After lunch we crossed the stream, and started a gradual climb to the top. The top of the first rise gave us a clear view westwards to the Grampians, and eastwards over Werribee, Melbourne and the Dandenongs. When we finally reached the summit of Flinders Peak, further areas came into view - all of Port Phillip Bay, Corio Bay, Arthur's Seat, the open ocean at Barwon Heads, and a panorama of Geelong. The lazy atmosphere of the warm, clear spring day bothered the leader as the party kept lying down and going to sleep. Eventually they were persuaded to follow the road down the mountain, turning right at the base and climbing the Big Rock, then proceeding through the State Forest, a plantation of tall, slim gums, to the van waiting at the entrance to the reserve. Most members appeared to have enjoyed the trip, in spite of the many mosquitoes.

FERN TREE GULLY - UPWEY - SELBY - BELGRAVE - EVELYN HECHT - 7th September.
Our party of fourteen first walked by back roads to Upwey, where we had a dry lunch in perfect weather. We called in at the Belgrave milk bars, then headed for the reservoir, where we boiled a billy for afternoon tea. By going up and over a hill and following a fern gully, we eventually reached Selby, where we "rail-bashed" to Belgrave. All voted the day a success.

MURRUNDINDI - BLACK RANGE - ST FILLEN'S - WARREN OLLIE - 13/14th September
An unexpected turn-up of nineteen enabled a van to be used. We arrived at Murrundindi in glorious weather, and started walking along the Murrundindi River, which was swollen and muddy. We found that a bridge had been washed away, and were forced to wade across the river with the water at the height of Warren's waist. The sun soon dried us out as we headed for the Wilhemina Falls. One member left the party to take photos at the foot of the falls, but couldn't find us again. We eventually met him again next day. It started to drizzle on the Sunday afternoon, though the weather up till then had been ideal, and the views which were to have been the crowning glory of the walk were completely obliterated. The countryside was pleasant, containing some rather scrubby areas, but also some open bush. All in all, it was quite an adventure.

KALLISTA - WOORI YALLOCK CREEK - EMERALD - PETER SALMON - 14th September.
In fine weather eleven of us set out for The Patch from Kallista. The country was open and easy to walk in. From The Patch we climbed a ridge, then dropped again to Fairy Dell, on the Woori Yallock Creek, for lunch. After lunch we followed the Menzies Creek to Emerald, when it started to drizzle. We had time to drink a cup of tea at Emerald before catching the bus home.

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
