Letters are being sent out to State Ministers regarding the potential hazards of woodchipping in the East Gippsland

#### Day Walks,

July 4th - MT. KOALA - MOLLISONS CREEK PYALONG.

TRANSPORT: Van from Batman Ave. 9.15 AM
EXPECTED TIME OF RETURN: 9.00 PM
MAP REFERENCE. Pyalong 1:50,000
APPROXIMATE DISTANCE: 8 miles.

From a point, approximately 5km north-west of Pyalong, we will head west into a range of low hills. From the southern end of this range we head south to Mollisons Creek which we follow east back to Pyalong.

Open, Green, gently rolling country with rocky outcrops. Bring a water bottle as this is sheep country.

#### July 11th - PAULS RANGE - SCHOOLHOUSE RIDGE.

EXPECTED TIME OF RETURN: 7.30 PM
MAP REFERENCE: Yarra Glen 1:50,000
Yan Yean 1:63,360 (out of print)
APPROXIMATE DISTANCE: 12 miles.

This walk offers beautiful views and a wide variety of Wild Life along one of the nicest little ranges close to Melbourne.

The walk will start at Toolangi township and proceed along a road before coming to the ridge of Pauls Range (642439). We will then walk along the ridge (on tracks mainly) in a southerly direction for about ten miles, finishing at Schoolhouse Ridge (638323) which is a few miles from Healesville.

It is necessary to bring water for lunch.

Please note that we will have a pick-up point for those walkers staying overnight in Healesville, after the Club Square Dance.

#### July 18th - MALMSBURY - BELLTOPPER HILL - TARADALE.

From Malmsbury Reservoir we walk through Old Malmsbury (town) to Belltopper Hill where we may explore old gold mines (tunnels - so bring torches!) Then we travel northwards to pick up the main Bendigo Aquaduct and follow it around to Taradale.

# July 25th - GOLDEN POINT - EXPEDITION PASS - MT. ALEXANDER. Easy/Med

LEADER: Rob Hayes (p) 95-8239
TRANSPORT: Van from Batman Ave. 9.15 AM
EXPECTED TIME OF RETURN: 9.00 PM
MAP REFERENCE: Castlemaine 1": 1 mile.
APPROXIMATE DISTANCE: 13 km - 500m up and 300m down.

After starting off lost we will climb the closest mountain to discover where we are. Somewhere between 4km and 8km later we should stymble across/wade around the Expedition Pass Reservoir. Medium walkers can then walk around the reservoir for about a km and then scramble up to the top of the ridge to join the easy walkers who have gone only 500m along a gently sloping animal track. After looking at the magnificent views from the next section of the ridge we drop down to have a dreaded HIGHWAY CROSSING. Then we have a pleasant stroll up a spur to the base of Mount Alexander. Depending on the mood of the party, and the light, we will either walk up Mt. Alexander or we will move a few hundred metres to the North to climb up the rock faces arriving exhausted at the top of the next mountain (100 metres higher than necessary) then proceed down to the Koala Sanctuary and the van. Bring water for lunch — refills may be obtained at the reservoir after lunch.



#### EXERPT FROM THE "ALPINE OBSERVER" Supplied by Geoff Kenafacke.

13th May, 1976 - The Snow Pole line between Falls Creek and Mt. Hotham is to be reconstructed soon by the F.C.V., the Minister for Tourism, Mr. Crozier has announced. Coloured markers and signs on the 3 metre high treated pine poles will indicate directions of the ski villages.

The Alpine Resorts Development Advisory Committee (ARDAC) initiated collection of funds and preliminary planning of the line. Total cost is expected to be \$20,000.

"This is just the start of what we hope will lead to a series of pole lines through the Alpine areas of Victoria." Mr. Crozier said.

The contributors to the line are the Department of Y.S. & R., Lands Department, Mt. Hotham Alpine Resort Committee of Management, S.E.C., and the Ministry of Tourism.

# REPORT ON ACTIVITIES OF THE CONSERVATION GROUP TO DATE, 1/6/76

At the first meeting of the Group this year (15-3-76) Gerry McPhee was re-elected Convenor. The 16 members present divided up into a number of sub-groups the result of their activities being:-

Letters have been written to Members of Parliament seeking their support to continue Funds for the Environment. Twenty Five replies have been received. The writers: Dave Oldfield, Janet White, Barbara Bryant and Joan Haig.

A Submission to the Land Conservation Council for the North-East Study Area (3,4,&5) was compiled by Fred Halls, Gerry McPhee and Athol Schafer.

Among other tasks parcelled out were: Keeping an eye on the activities of various Government Departments and other bodies. E.G. Sue Oldfield is keeping track of the Soil Conservation Authority, Geoff Crapper on the MMBW. The Group would welcome any volunteers for such surveillance work.

At the second meeting of the Group (10-5-76) Dave Oldfield presented a preview of evidence that will be submitted on behalf of the Club to the Transport Regulation Board. Commercial interests are seeking 4-wheel drive vehicle tours in the Alpine region and are seeking TRB approval. Barbara Bryant is investigating proposals to flood the Lower Gordon River, Tasmania, and to see in which way the Club can best oppose the scheme. George Telehin is studying the LCC Mallee area recommendations and Gerry McPhee is preparing a draft on proposed mining operations at Reedy Creek Chasm.

#### Review of Documents Received.

The ORV (off-road vehicle) has brought enjoyment to millions, opened up new fields of employment and has been a profitable business. Political economy dictates that nations must trade. We export primary produce, minerals (and next Uranium and hardwood forests) to Japan. In return we receive Hondas, Susukis etc., toys for western man's leisure. The result of the expediencies of trade is however not always the best. This the Americans are now discovering. A full page report in the Sydney Morning Herald (17-4-76) "Riding the Trail of Destruction" states that in the U.b. in 1960 there were 60,000 motorcycles. By 1972 there were 5.5 million, the increase mainly for use off-roads. The ORV user looks for difficult terrain against which to put his skill and the power of his machine - altogether an exhillerating recreation. The real cost has been unmeasured destruction of plants and animals, and often permanent loss of soil surfaces not to mention damage to both public and private property. The enjoyment of the ORV user is at the expense of all inhabitants, human and otherwise, past and present. Attempts by both government bodies and ORV clubs to mitigate some of the worst effects have always proved ineffectual.

"The basic gear of the motor-powered outdoorsman requires that 300 to 2,000 lbs of metal ore be mined from the earth and than an engine be created and fueled to propel his jeep, buggy or snow-mobile from spot to spot. The sport of the downhill skier demands that natural environments be cleared of trees, developed with lifts and lodges and be supplied with power to run these facilities." This quote comes from an article in a copy of "Backpacker" magazine. The author points out that the impact of the walker is very tiny when compared to that of other recreations. However, with an estimated six million backpackers in the U.S. (1971 figures) and an annual growth rate of wilderness trips in national parks at 35% the main problem is not so much misuse but overuse.

Continuel foot traffic soon erodes an earth track, especially on slopes. If the track is left, vegetation is trampled; litter is dropped; streams become polluted with detergents and human wastes; man-made shelters, fireplaces etc. are created that detract from the natural setting. On top of this nobody is certain what ideal wilderness behaviour should be; therefore education can play only a limited part.

In response to the problem two basic wilderness management systems are being tentatively applied. The first plan is to limit, by means of a permit system, the number of walkers to what it is estimated the environment can withstand. The basic weakness is that Park Services are notoriously understaffed to make the plan viablo. The virtues are prevention of overcrowding and the fact

...of reminding the public that natural resources are not limitless.

The second plan is to concentrate facilities at certain points along a given route or in a specified area; thus permanent structures are erected, ranging from fireplaces to hostels, toilet blocks to canteens, so the visitor does not have to carry his gear, and the surrounding sections are saved from too much pressure. This is now seen as largely self—defeating. The convenience of the shelters tend to attract people to the wilderness who would not go there if they had to carry their own tent and provisions. With heavy use the area around many of the shelters become litter d, stripped of firewood and green vegetation.

Leaving the U.S. and coming back home, we find that The Kosciusko National Park Plan of Management has something of both these systems now in force. The 612,000 hectare park is zoned into five areas. In the wilderness zones (54% of total area) no development is permitted other than walking tracks, signs, pack tent sites, survival huts, and essental track markers and snowpoles. In the natural areas (38%) additional features are included. These are safety fences, parking areas, public toilets, or anised camping and point sites. In development areas overnight accommodation is provided with a total number of people at 7,000. With day visitors the total visitor capacity will be 30,000. However future developments will be encouraged to remain outside the boundary of the park, at such places as Khancoban, Talbingo etc.

To prevent environmental damage, the frequency and number of walking parties are liable to be restricted. Other protective measures will be the closing of certain roads, removal of noxious weeds and animals, and demolition of unwanted structures. Vehicles must keep to scheduled tourist roads. There is to be no off-road recreation at all.

After examining the Plan I believe walkers will generally be happy with it.

DRAFT MANAGEMENT POLICIES FOR THE GRAMPIANS STATE FOREST. - Forests Commission, Vic.

The F.C.V., believing that it will still have management control of the Grampians after the L.C.C. recommendations are decided, has issued a rather comprehensive survey of the area, and which was published for a public conference held at Stawell last March.

They have divided the area into a number of zones. Hardwood production (70,000 hectares) and softwoods (1,100 hectares) make up for approximately a third of the total area. The remainder consists of natural, primitive and special feature zones plus recreational sites.

Regulations for camping independently away from established camping grounds are strict, though not unreasonable.

ACQUISITION OF ADUITIONAL LAND, PUCKAPUNYAL.

An Environmental Impact Statement issued by the Department of Defence.

The military desire to acquire to acquire 20,048 hectares of land to the west and north of Puckapunyal, thereby virtually doubling the existing area.

One of the reasons for this proposal is that the present area is not large enough to contain the requirements of today's armour and artillery. Present exercises are held in designated areas in the Big Desert and the Sunset Country in the north—west of the State. However the LCC. has given notice that it wishes to eventually close these training areas and proclaim them as wilderness and state parks respectively.

The Big Desert in South Australia is also to be incorporated into a national park which will preclude it as a training area.

Most of the contended area is State reserved forest on hilly ground, with the rest private grazing properties. Although within easy reach of Melbourne there appears to have been little, if any, bushwalking in the area. I suggest that one or two walks be taken through before it is ever proclaimed.


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
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
