FEBRUARY COMMITTEE MEETING NOTES

Official minutes will be posted in the Committee room in due course. Some points which came up: -

- TREASURER: Balance 31JAN78 \$2664-81. Bills passed for payment at the meeting totalled \$397-50, including \$300 provision for forthcoming Gronow's bill. The above balance is the final balance for 1977, since the club's year ends 31JAN. It compares with last year's final balance \$6213-78. The difference is largely accounted for by the fact that bills for the printing of both "Walk 1977" and "Walk 1978" have had to be met in the one year, and by advertising revenue that has still not come in. Ross outlined the recommendations he will put to the AGM re next year's subscription rates.
- WALKS SECRETARY: NOV: 198m + 65v = 263 = 149d + 114w/e. PROFIT \$10
 DEC: 135m + 38v = 173 = 110d + 63w/e. LOSS \$51
 Cumulative loss for the year is \$872, and reflects the fact that
 van charges were increased during the year. (The figure will not
 agree precisely with that in Treasurer's annual report because of a
 difference in the way in which monthly bills are offset against
 revenue).

LEADER: Harald Goetz TRANSPORT: Van from Batman Av. 9-15 a.m. EXPECTED TIME OF RETURN: 7 p.m. MAP REFERENCE: Tallarook 1:50,000 APPROXIMATE DISTANCE: 8 - 10 kms.

A walk along the Goulburn River. Please bring bathers and lunch.

March 5 TALLAROOK - CHERRY TREE RANGE - SEYMOUR

LEADER: Graham Hodgson TRANSPORT: Van from Batman Av. 9-15 a.m. EXPECTED TIME OF RETURN: 8 p.m. MAP REFERENCE: Tallarook 1:50,000 APPROXIMATE DISTANCE: 10 miles 16 Kms.

Unfortunately I have not been able to preview this walk in time for its inclusion in News, however I can assure people of a very picturesque trip up into the surrounding hills to the west of the Goulburn River. We will stay at about 600m all day so there will not be too many ups and downs. For those with maps, we will be commencing the trip at 432853 and finishing at Tallarook.

March 19 FRENCH ISLAND

LEADER: Art Terry TRANSPORT: Train. 9.25 a.m. from Flinders St. No.l platform. FARE: \$5.40 Return to Tankerton, French Island via Stony Point. (includes ferry fare). EXPECTED TIME OF RETURN: 8-15 p.m. MAP REFERENCE: Broadbent's Phillip Island No. 148. APPROXIMATE DISTANCE: 8 miles.

This is an interesting easy walk gradually climbing to the Pinnacles - about 150' A.S.L. The highest point on the island is Mt. Wellington 210'.From the Pinnacles a good view of the island and Westernport Bay is obtained. We encounter a little scrub so be prepared with a pair of longs for about a mile. From the Pinnacles we descend to the beach for a swim and a stroll via the beach back to Tankerton. Time on the Island is now cut to about 5 hours due to the 6 p.m. ferry from Cowes being discontinued - hence a short walk and a short lunch break. Bring water, long pants and swimming gear. We catch the ferry back to Stony Point at 5-30 p.m.

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CHRISTMAS WALK - BOGONG HIGH PLAINS

After weeks of waiting for that holiday of a lifetime we headed north on a rather wet 26th December. The weather however, improved as we went on towards Falls Creek, and so did our hopes for a good walk.

Next morning while going up, things didn't look that bright, but I consoled myself thinking it to be low clouds. Half an hour later I was proved wrong because the rain became stronger and Steven and I had to seek refuge at Wallace's Hut. At 9-15 a.m. we left finally for the walk with a difference - where all 16 participants were never again together during any day. We left, during - what was now pouring rain, for our first destination. But we never arrived there. Crossing the High Plains we had hail coming towards us in such a strong and unpleasant manner that my glasses fogged up and I was not able to see where I was staggering to. Of course - the weight of my pack, which felt as though it was rocks, did not help at all. After taking refuge in a hut for morning tea and a last pep talk from Graham (who then left us) we proceeded down towards Weston's Hut dropping off 4 of our members on the way. (Later that day I would envy them for being at heated Wilky Hut while we kept battling the elements.) At Westen's Hut again we found refuge from the hail and rain and an opportunity to warm ourselves up and dry our clothes. As we had lunch the sun came through the clouds and some of the more ambitious members wanted to go on. But. it was not meant to be, because as soon as the fire went out - the sun disappeared too. Finally the sun came through just long enough for Marijka to press on to Cabungra Hut where we put our tents up for the night.

Next morning we found our tents covered with snow and a changeable sky. Marijke decided to miss Feathertop and return to Blair's Hut with the option for a daytrip to Mt. Feathertop. Tim, Peter, Steven and Jeff decided to take the original four up Mt. Hotham across the Razorback to Mt. Feathertop and down to Blair's Hut. The walk took them 12 hrs. for the 19 miles, and everyone was delighted to see them stagger back at night. Marijke, Cynthia, Jeff and Harald set off on the same morning to Mt. Feathertop but made it only to High Knob (except Marijke who turned back). The view from High Knob was found to be very rewarding and I was surprised to see snow still at Mt. Feathertop.

After a very short night in bed, the next day dawned sunny and clear and Marijke took us up to the High Plains to dispose of us to Graham who, was impatiently waiting for us. But we lost Jeff Greenwood who wore himself out the day before and was only found again at camp that night. We proceeded to Mt. Niggerhead, Mt. Fainter (well named for those exhausted from all the morning's climb!) and Mt. Fainter North. Going downhill was a relief, but I'm still trying to work out why Graham moved on every time I came near him.

Next morning's descent started quite pleasantly along a lovely track down to the Kiewa Valley Road. But when the road had been crossed - guess what? Right back up the other side! Graham took us on the way to Bogong Creek Saddle, up along the aquaduct on a rather hot day. The typist depends greatly on the response from club members in forwarding Walk Previews, 'Along the Track' articles, members' advertisements, the 'news' page and reports on social events; special club activities such as Navigation Weekend Courses etc. The regular features of President's article, coming social events, brief committee meeting notes, welcome to new members, changes of address, club clean-up notices, all come from committee members.

Usually I have found approaching members personally, with a request to write a report, produces pleasing re-actions. Members generally are quite happy about this so long, I feel, I seek different members when possible, so that a person may only be approached, once or at the most twice, in one year. Of course it is great to receive the material, which oftens happens, without having to ask for it. ANNUAL REPORTS 1977

PRESIDENT:

I don't think there is much doubt that the club is in a very healthy state - a state of vitality which might almost be described as "bursting at the seams". Membership is at an all-time high. The Alpine Walking Track Project (AWT) has given a "theme" to our walking which has had effects extending far beyond the immediate walks and the direct participants. The social life of the club must at least be termed "active" - though there have been times when maybe "frenetic" would be closer to the mark (or am I just getting too old to be able to keep up with the pace?!!). "Walk 1978" appeared well back in 1977 and has been favorably received by both press and public; perhaps the real litmus test is that we now have new advertisers coming forward spontaneously wanting to buy space in the next edition. I think the club can look back on a very good year indeed.

Well - who shall we blame? Certainly the committee has been very active, and many of its members were willing to tackle things well outside the range of their assigned portfolios. However, the reasons for the success of the club extend far beyond the formal committee. If I were to try to begin to acknowledge people's efforts individually, either on the committee or behind the scenes, this would be a very long report. For example: members who made their places available for club social functions; a member whose efforts under the club insignia drew favorable comment from one of the most prominent (and fastidious) of Australia's bushwalking cartographers; a member who, in spite of heavy commitments, has come to our rescue on the conservation scene at least twice during the year; the phantom cartoonist who brightens up NEWS every month; people who were willing to give up time to drive for the AWT..... just to mention at random a few of the many less-obvious but vital contributions. There are many others. I can only say that for as long as the club can continue to draw on such a vast pool of energy and enthusiasm I have no fears whatsoever for its continued prosperity and success.

It seems a pity to have to end on a pessimistic note, but the present condition and future prospects of the country in which we walk seem to me as dismal as those of the club itself seem bright. AWT stage 4 traversed country which I first saw about eight years ago when I had recently arrived in Victoria. It was impossible to avoid contrasting "then" and "now". Then most of it was remote wilderness, with only very few incursions to mar it. Now, in every direction the eye can trace, it is a shattered, blasted landscape. IT IS ALREADY TOO LATE to talk about conservation in the Alpine area. Nevertheless, even our efforts to shut the stable door after the horse has escaped are being resisted and compromised at the level where the future of this ruined region is being decided. The picture in Tasmania is just as bleak...no part of its "wilderness" which I traversed this summer (and I was off tracks most of the time) has escaped similar, if so far perhaps less severe, compromise of its values. I think we should try to put things in better perspective by dropping the word "conservation" and putting the word "restoration" in its place. We must keep trying, but I am afraid I cannot see things improving in our time.

WALKS SECRETARY:

For the first time in many years we have had a reduction in the total number of walkers. The statistics for this year and last year for comparison are:-

Thus there were 340 fewer walkers most of whom were not on day walks. Additionally this reduction is reflected in the numbers of visitors - 826 for 1977 against 1068 for 1976.

As a matter of policy we have increased the number of trips in an attempt to avoid the ecological disaster of 50 walkers on one walk. This part of the club activities has lost money (approx. \$900) over the year. Unfortunately a rise in transport charges coincided with a fare rise which was designed to correct the situation mid year. The series of walks covering the Alpine Walking track have been added to the program and have provided the harder walking element with a challenge.

My thanks go to the many leaders who volunteered or were pressed into service and to the two walks sub-committees - day and weekend who helped provide such varied programs.
