So you thought that the walk for this weekend was to be Terrick Terrick and Mt. Hope. Well, you were wrong" I have decided not to try to come with the wilt's of Terrick Terrick etc. but will instead show any willing participants some of the delights of the Warby Ranges near Wangaratta.

We will meet in the Warby Ranges at the Pine Valley Picnic Ground at about noon on Saturday, so you will be able to have a good sleep on Friday night before making the $2\frac{1}{2}-3$ hour trip to the ranges. We will walk on Saturday afternoon and all day Sunday.

The delights of the Warby Ranges include open forest, granite formations, tiny streams and medium size waterfalls. Some of the delights are, of course, dependant upon adequate rainfall.

The camp on Saturday night will be near the cars, so you will only need a day pack. Water should be brought in case the streams are not flowing.
