IN TIME TO CATCH THE 1.30 TRAIN TO BALACLAVA.

One hundred years ago it was Crown Land, useless for development. It took 20 years or more to be drained and filled in with the rock and soil of Point Ormond Hill, the latter now only a dwarf compared to what it used to be. We will look at the traces and relics of the swamp; the National Park that never was; a Sea-Beach railway planned but never built - yet still may be; local native vegetation - in the St. Kilda Botanical Gardens - the highlight of the walk, including the world famous Alister Clark Memorial Rose Garden. Finishing 5pm.

#### ATTENTION ALL WALK LEADERS

- a good photocopy of the map with points clearly marked

For many years we have been spoiled by having Dennis, and more recently Ted, as our driver. We can no longer get away with giving vague instructions and relying on the driver's experience to guess the desired spot.

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#### OBITUARY

Those who knew him will be saddened to learn that Ivor Davies passed away on Sunday 10th December 1989. Ivor had been a walker going back to pre-war England and Germany. Fost-war migration brought Ivor to Victoria where he joined the Y.H.A. and, since the late '60s, the Melbourne Bushwalkers. At a time when the Club was short of leaders, Ivor acted as co-leader on a number of walks. In later years ill health restricted him to easy Saturday walks.

Probably his last pack carry was on The Jagungal trip when it rained incessantly and everyone did a phenominal walk to get out a day early. Ivor was interested in conservation issues and devoted much time and effort to furthering the conservation cause. He was also a member of the VNPA. In Heidelberg he was a member of the Conservation & Historical Society and also went dancing at the Senior Citizens Club. He was an expert on camera mechanics and was always ready to help practically or with advice. A man of many parts was Ivor and he will be sadly missed by his many friends in the Club. 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# SOUTHWEST NATIONAL PARK - TASMANIA, CHRISTMAS 1989 PRECIPITOUS BLUFF WORLD HERITAGE AREA

The walk began on December 23rd in a forest area, just outside Lune River, a tiny town some 105 km south of Hobart on the Huon highway. We climbed up and along Moonlight ridge through forest gradually emerging onto scrub and rock, with views of the coast and an impressive mountain range. Peter soon felt a desire to see the famous Tasmanian mud at close wuarters and went in up to his middle. For the first two days the weather was fine, with one or two of us suffering a little from sunburn, despite sunscreen. On Christmas Day we set out from our campsite at Pigsty Ponds and climbed Mount La Perouse (1158m). Fine weather gave us magnificent views all round. Finding snow on the top, we indulged ina snowball fight and took photographs of this unexpected White Christmas. After exploring the Cockscomb, an interesting rocky ridge, we climbed down 266m to Swallows Nest Lake for a refreshing swim. Screams rent the air as hot sweaty bodies plunged into water at 1 above freezing! Later the same day we encountered our first thick scrub, in particular Richea Scoparia, a rather prickly shrub

which we got to know rather well over the next few days. That evening, just as we were stuffing the turkey lentils, the first rain fell. After our sumptuous meals we exchanged gifts which were, of course, all edible or drinkable. Trish heroically carried a quantity of port in secret which went down rather well. The next day we climbed round Pindars Peak with a force 8 gale and rain. Despite this Mark and Gina insisted on climbing to the top to look at the mist. Then the weather got worse. The scoparia got thicker and Brian's navigational abilities were tested more than once. We made camp at Wylly's plateau that night and stayed there all the next day. I didn't poke my head (or anything else) out of the tent for 24 hours for fear of frostbite. Our leader then declared that the weather was improving and we left the comparative comfort of our tents to do battle with the scoparia again.

Our efforts were eventually rewarded when we had climbed Precipitous Bluff (1145m) and again had clear views, this time of mountains, coast and the New River Lagoon. The campsite that night was one sort of plateau near the top of the Bluff. I spent all night trying to stop myself sliding down what seemed like a 30 gradient. Climbing down we came through some wonderful forest, with verdant mosses and ferns. On reaching the lagoon we followed the "walking track" which was in the lagoon! We waded along it for some four hours during which time Felicity took a close look at the bottom, forgetting that she did not have her snorkel and mask. The water depth varied between knee and knickers. The following day we walked from Prion Beach to Surprise Beach and Granite Beach. These were beautiful bays with breakers and on Granite Beach Marianne was the first into the sea to check the temperature. A convenient waterfall provided a shower afterwards. Our route for the remainder of that day took us through some creeks, mud and into some beautiful glades, before we camped by the seashore for our last night. Having had a long day we were ravenous and ate up everything that we could find in our packs. We finished at Cockle Creek the next day, driving back to Brian's house outside Hobart in time to have a barbecue and some dancing to see in 1990.

This was my first trip to Tasmania and this walk certainly provided an opportunity to see a variety of terrain and scenery. The wild flowers were everywhere and the forst was truly quite beautiful. I shall be back to see some more of this island. Thanks, Brian, for organising and leading this walk. You did a great job.
