"TEARAWAYS" ON SUNDAY WALKS

My idea of a bushwalk is a leisurely stroll taken at a pace which allows a person to observe and appreciate the beauty of the bushland or wherever one is walking, in other words a person should have time to commune with nature, frequent stops and a long break for lunch (weather permitting) goes a long way in making a day and the hack an enjoyable one, that is my style of leading a walk but a walk along these lines is an exception these days rather than the rule as it used to be, the quality of Sunday walks has deteriorated over the past 18 months, there are several contributing factors, I will deal with only one of these in this article, the tearaway members mainly, (most of whom never lead walks) who go like bats out of hell often leaving the Leader and the rest of the party well behind and often out of sight, they show no consideration for the Leader and the other people left far behind, this practice has been responsible for split parties, time wasted looking for the tearaways and late arrivals back in town, the most recent case was at Anglesea.

I have been aware of this situation for some time but have delayed writing about it until such time as other leaders also became aware of it and expressed their views. In the last couple of weeks 3 other senior leaders have spoken to me about it, that makes 4 of us, enough to suggest that there is inded something wrong with Sunday walks, I never allow any person to go ahead of me when I lead as I put the message over loud and clear in that respect before the walk commences, even so on a recent walk of mine in the Rushworth area and with a few of the tearaways in the group I did have some trouble one fellow repeatedly tried to take the lead even when I was on compass. He was quite a pest, and there is one thing that is certain, I will never ever accept him on any future walks that I lead. Another senior leader has threatened to ban a woman member from his future walks if she persists in getting ahead of him, these tearaways a senior woman leader told me recently put her under so much stress that she no longer gets any pleasure from leading.

Another senior leader who recently led a walk in the Otways told me that about a dozen of his group were not in the least interested in looking at the beautiful native orchids that he was pointing out to them, all they seemed interested in was getting to the bus as quick as they could go. To cap it all off, they tore off on a wrong track somewhere along the way and he had to leave the rest of the group and go after them, It is amazing they don't know where they are going but they are hell bent to get there. The Walks Secretary will find his already difficult task of obtaining good leaders more so, when leaders decline his offer to lead.

The only person who has the right to be out front is leader, who can regulate his timing to fit in with the structure of his/her walk, the sooner the tearaways absorb this the better it will be for all, it has always been an unwritten law that the leader is the only one out in front unless he gives permission for the group to surge ahead e.g. climbing a hill or mountain with the instructions to wait at the top, in the past good manners have guaranteed that the leader was out front. perhaps it is time to make it a written law. It no doubt will be a sobering jolt to these tearaways to learn that a leader has the right to ban any person from a walk. I have already banned one member from any future walks that I lead, another leader has threated to ban a woman member, you may be next so wake up to yourselves and stay behind the leader, that is your place, the leaders place is out front. It is not only leaders who are losing interest in Sunday walks some members are also, on account of the walks proceeding at a gallop in order to keep up with the tearaways. From my observations, I would say that the turnover of visitors is even higher than it was some time back, could be they lose interest in our walks for the same reason, it is just as well that they keep coming in.

9TH-12TH MARCH, 1991 FRENCHMAN'S CAP, TASMANIA

MED

I plan to lead this walk for four days over the Labour Day long weekend encompassing the dates 9-12 March, 1991 (inclusive). Access to the area is from Queenstown and I plan to fly down direct by light aircraft from Melbourne to Queenstown. For a group of between four and six, including myself. The aircraft cost will be only \$180 each. The return flight down will be via the picturesque west coast of Tasmania.

One of the most striking peaks of Tasmania's South West, Frenchman's Cap stands in isolation, surrounded very broadly on three sides by the Franklin River. Apart from the rivers, this peak is the central feature of the Franklin - Lower Gordon Wild Rivers National Park. Its sheer, three hundred metre high, east face and sloping western sides form the classic cap shape after which it is named. The views from the summit are extensive and the many glacial lakes make the walk spectacular. The walk round trip from the Lyell Highway can be done comfortably in three days.

23RD MARCH - 1ST APRIL THE OVERLAND TRACK TASMANIA

LEADER : DAVE VINCENT TRANSPORT : LIGHT AIRCRAFT

I plan to lead this walk over Easter for a ten day period over the dates 23rd March to 1st April, 1991 (inclusive). The walk will commence from the airstrip at Cradle Valley Camp. Access will be direct from Melbourne by light aircraft. The walk will finish at Cynthia Bay near the Derwent Bridge over the Lyell Highway. The group will then travel by the bus service to Queenstown and fly out from there direct to Melbourne. The return flight will be via the spectacular west coast of Tasmania. The estimated cost of the aircraft for a group of four to six, including myself, will be only \$200 each. Direct access to the start of the walk using the airstrip at Cradle Valley Camp is a definite plus and saves considerable travelling time.

The Overland Track would have to rank as Australia's most popular long distance walks. Traversing Tasmania's highest country, it crosses open moors and plunges through deep forests in the mountainous region between Gradle Mountain in the north and Lake St Clair in the south. The track very carefully avoids too much steep climbing, leaving the summit climbs to be done as side trips. Many huts have been constructed enroute to provide shelter in bad weather. The track is well defined and the scenery it passes through is nothing short of spectacular. The side trips to Pine Valley and the Labyrinth should not be missed.

The track is clearly defined and has been carefully aligned to avoid any steep climbing. There are only two major mountain passes to cross and even these are relatively gentle. The full walk, including several side trips to climb the major peaks, takes about nine days. This allows for a casual pace and a couple of days of rest during bad weather, if required.

GENERAL BUSINESS:

SMOKING: The concerns expressed by Art Terry were discussed at some length. The committee has determined that club policy is "not to prohibit smoking on walks but smokers are to be encouraged to move away from others and not cause a nuisance". Smoking is of course banned in the bus. To be more restrictive would require an amendment to the rules being put to the A.G.M. Art has made a request that this be done.

TEARAWAYS: (See letter by Art Terry on page 2). This has apparently been a problem on a number of walks. Strong walkers who feel the urge to stride out have to curb the temptation of wanting to surge ahead of the group on organised walks. The rules are designed to ensure as far as possible the safety of the group and that the club is not brought into disrepute by having members lost or worse. Leaders are reminded that they are required to note any instances of unsatisfactory behaviour in their walk report. The Walk Secretary will follow up such reports with the individuals concerned and if they continue to cause problems, The Committee will take disciplinary action which could entail loss of membership.

ADVERTISING: The survey of opinion attracted little interest, 8 against and 11 for. Having taken the views of members into account the committee have the option to take up advertising next year if it is considered desirable and practicable.

VISITORS FEES: As from 3rd February, 1991 visitors fees will be increased to \$5.00 per walk to be rebated for qualifying walks on application for membership.

AUSTRALIA'S BUSH HERITAGE FUND

Each month the Club receives requests for donations from various groups. This month we received one that may be of interest.

In June 1990, Dr. Bob Brown, Tasmanian conservation activist and MP, purchased two privately-owned forest blocks on Drys Bluff, the north-eastern end of the Great Western Tiers, that were about to be sold to the logging industry. His donation and deposit was the proceeds of his Goldman environmental prize, \$49,000, and the balance was borrowed from the banks on a short-term loan. The \$200,000 balance has to be raised soon.

The Tasmanian Conservation Trust has established a fund called Australia's Bush Heritage Fund to raise this money, and also funds to purchase other private land of outstanding significance that is under threat. Its activities will also extend to arranging for bequests of bush blocks, and arranging an advisory service to introduce sellers of bush blocks to "caring" buyers. he trust urgently seeks donations, which are tax-deductible. The amount of work undertaken by grass roots Clubs needs to be acknowledged and given credit.

The clearing of tracks is an ongoing role of many clubs, and is a material way of ensuring access to walking areas on a self-help basis. The preparation of submissions regarding land management schemes has been undertaken by some Clubs, which allows the expert knowledge of walkers to influence the decision making process of government.

News has come to hand that the 1991 "Walker" will published, and the excellent publication "Walking

in the Otways" will have a reprint very soon.

The amount and variety of outings as shown in Club newsletters is indicative of a large leadership pool able to safely take parties, in all weathers, to almost every area of the State and beyond.

River News

The Federation has received a report (July '90) from the Standing Committee on Rivers and Catchments. This was by courtesy of the Recreation Representative, Chris McLaughlin.

The Committee had studied extensive Autumn flood damage in the Avon, Macalister and Thomson Rivers. Many parts of these catchments had recorded well over 300mm. of rain and peak flows in the Avon of 350,000 megalitres per day had almost

completely eliminated its aesthetic appeal.

Catchment Co-ordinating Groups (CCG) have been formed to enable reps. from different interested parties to gain a wider perspective of catchment management. The make-up of typical CCG would consist of several government departments together with Victorian Farmers Federation, Extractive Industries, Conservation Interests and Recreation Interests.

Problems (and opportunities) associated with river frontages are being examined and if you would like to make an input to this process, send your comments/gripes to Chris at P.O. Box 78, Hampton, 3188.
