MORE NEWS FOR "THE NEWS"

We would like to congratulate the Club on the high standard of publication of "THE NEWS". It looks great. <u>However</u>! Where is the news? What has happened to the pages of "Along the Track"? Where are the gossip columns? Where are the little tit-bits about people in the Club, what they are doing, where they are going? For non-active, interstate and overseas members "THE NEWS" is of little relevance.

When people proceeded to write the history of the first 50 years of the Club they read through the old newsy "NEWS" and there it all was: all they had to do was write it up and edit it. Where do the writers of the second 50 years get their information?

The last "NEWS" (Edition 494) has 15 pages all beautifully set out and presented. It includes two and a bit pages of ads. We were against paid advertising in "THE NEWS" but thought that maybe if the Club could offset the cost a little we may get a better product. But no! The articles are spread too thinly - we have lots of unnecessary wordage. Why quote MBW Inc. Rule 6(2) to (5) on the front page? If we are in doubt we can always look it up. On page 3 the call for photographs could be said in half the space. Pages 4-7 could be cut in half - track notes are more use than walks previews. The whole page ad for the Marysville weekend is far too extravagant. New Members could be reduced to 3 columns on page 9.

With the amount of space that we have saved we could print more walks reports, which include track notes for future leaders to use when previewing walks, more social news, more copy for future historians. The short walk reports in recent editions of "THE NEWS" are of little use to future leaders.

It appears that the equation for the amount of information contained in a Bushwalking Club's Newsletter is -

greater number of members = fewer number of pages of news.

Is this because the fewer the number of members the more dedicated and committed they are? We have both been involved with editing, copy writing and producing "THE NEWS" and know what an onerous task it is.

We do not know whether the Club still receives the magazine of the Newcastle Bushwalkers Inc. If not we could photocopy one and send it down. This monthly magazine is poorly produced - still on the old hand-turned gestetner - often difficult to read - just like our "NEWS' used to be in the old days - but it is packed full of information. The walk reports are track notes, describing every aspect of the walk from terrain to campsites, giving map references where ridges or gullies should be followed etc. The social columns tell what members are doing. The Newcastle Club has only 50 members. Look through the MBW "NEWS" when we had 50 members! Then we also produced an annual magazine called "WALK"!

We now have over 300 members and cannot even produce an informative news bulletin. People cry costs! Maybe we should dispense with the glossy printing and go back to the gestetner. We feel that presenting the information is the most important aspect of "THE NEWS", not its packaging.

Let us hope that our comments will stir someone into action and we can look forward to a bigger, newsier bulletin.

TRANSPORT FOR SUNDAY WALKS

An Extraordinary General Meeting was held on 29th April 1992 to discuss the pros and cons of retaining the Club van. (Minutes of the meeting are printed on page 11.) After lengthy discussion the following resolution was passed -

That the Club sell the Bedford van and that a chartered bus be used for Sunday walks.

I think this matter has now become an issue for the whole Club and not just the Sunday walkers, so I urge **all** members to exercise their right to vote, in person at the meeting or by proxy using the form at the back of NEWS.

In this forested walk near the boundaries of the O'Shannassy catchment, we will see evidence of last century gold mining activities. Part of the walk is beside a hand cut water race which originally diverted water from the O'Shannassy River to the mines. Towards the end of the walk there will be an option for some to do an extra 2-3 km loop, since the standard circuit does not make for a very long walk in normal conditions.

ALONG THE TRACK

MOONLIGHT ON THE COAST IN CROAJINGOLONG NATIONAL PARK 17-20 APR 1992

It sounded a great walk and it was. Four days walking along the coast from Mallacoota to Point Hicks with the possibility of some moonlight walking on the beach and maybe even some swimming. There were problems for the leader. Organising a bus trip is easy compared with finding cars and drivers for a 550 km each way trip with driving on Good Friday eve and Easter Monday night. Then there was the hundred kilometre car shuffle, and some people who worked on Thursday and some who worked on Tuesday. These worries were not mine. I drove 2 km to my chauffeur's home. On the way down we had time to explore the lake at Sale, the ocean at Lakes Entrance and the Snowy River at Orbost.

On Friday morning, the lucky ones amongst us were driven to the start of the walk and while the drivers travelled more kilometres we explored the rocky coast, looked at two rock caves carved by wind and waves and leisurely wandered along a couple of beaches. By lunch time the whole group of thirteen were temporarily together and we set off on tracks amongst the coastal woodlands. Camp was on the beach. For some of us on the sand, hopfully above high tide position. Tents were erected, water found (a long way back along the track), the fire lighted and some walkers went surfuing. Two naked bodies were observed catching the waves by moonlight. Next day we walked 25 km mainly through coastal woodlands. The leader was in a hurry as it was low tide at Wingan Inlet at 3.30 p.m. and he hoped to be able to cross the river at that time. We arrived about an hour late. A miscellaneously undressed set of individuals tried various directions for the shallow sandy crossing and after many changes of direction everyone was across with a dry pack having been no more than chest deep in the river.

The following day was easy, with a late start for a nature ramble, then some beach walking, granite headland and exploration, more beach walking and more granite headland hopping. Camp was at the top of a sand dune with a lagoon behind us and ocean in front. After eating most people went for walks along the beach in the full moonlight.

Monday morning we walked along the beaches and had arrived at the base camp at Thurra River for morning tea. We planned to leave packs here while we side tripped to the lighthouse. But heavy rain turned morning tea into lunch and then it was decided to abandon camp. I spent Tuesday morning with the wallabies and stalagmites at Buchan Caves.

It was a great moonlit Easter. Thanks GT. Spencer George


