This walk involves beach, rock and track walking around Cape Woolamai. There are excellent views of Cape Patterson, San Remo, Mornington Peninsular and Churchill and French Islands. Cape Woolamai is a reserve for a large colony of short-tailed shearwaters (Mutton Birds).

Sandra Bardwell describes this walk in her *50 Day Walks Near Melbourne* as "an English-style country ramble along streams and lanes". Being the end of March we might also have to cope with some English-style rain and mud but, if the weather is kind, the panoramic views from Johns Hill across to Port Phillip Bay and Western Port can be captivating.

Descending Johns Hill, we join Menzies Creek at Avars Picnic Ground. We continue to follow the creek after it changes its name to Sassafras and then on to Moxhams Picnic Ground. We cross the streams quite frequently, though (with some notable exceptions) sturdy bridges have been/are being built. Up to this point we have been using defined paths through thick vegetation and trees, walking close to the road, though largely unaware of it. From Moxhams we follow Priors, Portman, William and Ridge roads to return to the cars. The return is a steady climb and some of the roads are steep so we may leave a car/s at Moxhams for anyone wanting to call it a day at that stage.

Bring warm and rainproof clothing and water as well as lunch.

Starting at the site planned for a dam (which may still be built) we blow up our lilos and paddle down this beautiful river. There are a couple of big, named rapids (which can be portaged by the faint-hearted), and numerous small rapids, interspersed with stretches of calm water. There is a short, steep climb at the end.

You'll need a lilo in good repair, preferably a box-walled one as they float well, a paddle (if you want to keep up), lots of patching material and Selley's Quick-Grip or equivalent. Wear clothing that will cover you from head to foot as there is no shade in the middle of the river. Runners are the best footwear. Two hats are a good idea in case you lose one. Plus the usual weekend walking gear, including a parka to keep out the wind.

Liloing on rapids is quite dangerous, so a buoyancy vest and a stack hat are strongly recommended.

WILKINSON LODGE REPORT FOR 1992

I put most of my 1992 Wilky report in last November's *NEWS* so I refer readers to that edition. The only comments I have received related to point 6 (how the woodshed holds less than one winter's supply of wood and we may have go to a wood/briquette mix again if wood is used at last year's high rate).

I don't like briquettes, they are dirty, dusty and present an ash disposal problem, to say nothing of the awkward handling to get them in. This year there will be 2 loads (2 x 5 tonne) of wood taken in so it will not be seasoned at all except for that in the woodshed. Provided all groups are conscious of the need to conserve the wood in the woodshed for following winter groups then I think it best to put aside the idea of briquettes for 1993.

As mentioned in November, Wilky had a busy year and due to the new accounting system it is clearly financial enough to consider replacing the stove from its own funds. Summer 94 would be a good time for this.

I am not standing for Lodge Manager this year. Wilky is held with such affection within the Club that I think there should be ample candidates for the position. I can provide support in the transition but feel I cannot devote a full year to the position.

As a personal opinion I think it very important that we maintain the links we have developed with other clubs and kindred groups; these, and continuing good relations with the Parks Service are vital.

I'd particularly like to thank Doug Pocock for his support and the load he has taken on in organising Wilky's 60th birthday celebrations. There are many others I can thank, the enthusiasts who are always ready to muck in, but I would miss some and the *NEWS* editor would look darkly upon the amount of typing.

- The figures for 1992 are generally lower than the previous five years, especially for the day walks. The Wednesday, Dandenongs and Historical walks are all slightly down in numbers but are still well supported. The main concern is the average attendance of Sunday bus trips has fallen from 37 to 34. We need to ensure that this trend does not continue, otherwise we will face financial loss as well as missing out on new members. We need to plan interesting walks to encourage people to come along and to welcome visitors to our walks.
- The overnight trips are solidly supported with some new walkers joining in. To encourage new backpackers we have had demonstrations of cooking and how to pack a lightweight rucksack. The hire equipment has been upgraded which makes it easier for people starting on overnight walking.
- Our Club should aim to increase bushwalking skills of all our members and especially our leaders. We can all improve our abilities to plan and organise a walk, to navigate and to deal with emergencies. Suggestions to achieve this are welcome. Also the new Committee will be pleased to hear from you about fresh ideas for both day and overnight walks.
- Many people helped run the Walks Programme including Alan Miller (Sunday walks), Rosemary Thomson (Wednesdays), Michael Humphrey (Dandenongs), Athol Schafer (Historical), Marilyn Whimpey, Bill Metzenthén, Philip Larkin, Jean Giese (Walks Sub-committee), plus all our leaders - thanks to you all.

MORAN RIVER:

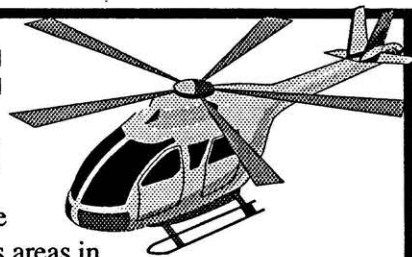
April 25 - May 15 1993

Situated just to the south of the Mitchell Plateau in the Kimberley, the Moran River is one of the least known and least accessible wilderness areas in Australia. It is also one of the most incredibly beautiful. The river gorges seem to go on forever. Aboriginal art sites, shady monsoon forest, waterfalls, abundant wildlife, good fishing - this area has it all. Although this will be only our fourth visit, **the Moran has a greater percent of repeat visits than any other area we visit.**

Two weeks is not enough to do justice to this magnificent area. Our trip lasts three. We will beat the problem of accessibility by using a combination of helicopters and light aircraft to get us to and from the walk and to set down a food drop at our halfway point. Although long distance helicopter rides are very expensive, we are so keen to ensure that this trip goes ahead that we are offering a substantial advance purchase discount to anyone booking before 10 March.

2. **Minutes:**

Motion - That the minutes of the Annual General Meeting held on 26 February 1992 be held as a true and accurate record of that meeting.
P - Geoff Mattingley S - Doug Pocock. Carried.

Motion - That the minutes of the Extraordinary General Meeting held on 29 April 1992 be held as a true and accurate record of that meeting.
P - Alan Miller S - Janet Norman Carried.

Motion - That the minutes of the Extraordinary General Meeting held on 10 June 1992 be held as a true and accurate record of that meeting.

3. **Business arising:**
 - 3.1 **Bequest of the late Alex Rolfe**
It was suggested that the bequest be used to provide a fireproof box in which the Wilky logbooks could be safely stored. It was also suggested that alternatively a professional copy on microfilm might be made.
Action : The Wilky sub-committee would examine these suggestions.
 - 3.2 **Bus**
Arising from the EGM of 29 April a bus sub-committee was set up and reported back to the committee with three options: Buy another bus, hire, or buy or lease a bus in conjunction with a third party. It was decided that the preferred option was to continue to hire a bus.
 - 3.3 **Model Rules**
Since the EGM's and the questions that had been raised regarding the proxy forms, we had raised the issue with the Corporate Affairs Office and we were awaiting a reply.
 - 3.4 **Elections**
The position of Treasurer was open for election. Alan Clarke had been acting Treasurer and was proposed by Geoff Mattingley and seconded by Paul Gray. Carried.
This left a position of vice-President open, since Alan Clarke could not hold both positions, and Marilyn Whimpey was proposed by Janet Norman and seconded by Mick Mann. Carried.
4. **Financial Report**
Alan Clarke presented a financial report which showed that the club was in a healthy state and that no increases in bus fees were necessary so long as the number of Sunday walkers remained about the same as the recent average.
Motion: "That the meeting accept the Treasurer's report" Proposed - Mick Mann, Seconded Bob Steel. Carried.
5. **Other Business**
The matter of producing 'News' on re-cycled paper was raised. It was explained to the meeting that this was technically not possible at present due to the quality limitations of re-cycled paper and the demands of the copying process employed.
Action: A note explaining this would be published in 'News'.
The meeting closed at 9.32 p.m..
