PROPOSED LIFE MEMBERS

ART TERRY

Art Terry joined Melbourne Bushwalkers in 1965. Art's first walk with the Club was a weekend trip from Fernshaw via Mt St Leonard to Healesville from 2-4 July 1965. His second Club walk was the following Sunday 11 July from Macedon to Woodend through Black Forest. Sunday 18 July 1965 was his third trip to Murchison Falls and Diggers Gully.

Then for 27 years, Art has walked frequently with the Club on weekend trips, Sunday walks and extended trips. Accurate navigation and the ability to light a fire in rain or snow make him a valuable member of a party. Art led his first weekend trip on 10-11 September 1966 from Tallarook to Mt Marianne and Yea. On 13 November 1966 he led his first Sunday walk to Little Rive Gorge, Durdi and Warrah Reservoir. Christmas 1966 he led his first extended 4-day walk for the Club from Bennies to Cobbler, The Razor, Crosscut Saw and Howitt.

Art has led more than 115 walks for the Club totalling more than 170 days of leadership. A feature of his leadership is his care for all members of his party.

Art led track clearing weekends when Club members cleared some of the thick undergrowth which was hiding the remains of timber tramlines in the Ada Valley. Weekend walks by train from Broadford Railway Station to Yea Railway Station gave Art the idea which became the Broadford to Yea marathon run, when the 45 kilometre trip between the two stations is completed in one day of about six hours running, with Mt Marianne and Mt Jimmy being two of the many hills climbed.

Over the years Art has led many Club bike rides. Most of these were by van when some of the seats were removed so that there was space for the bikes. The direction of riding was decided on the day so that the wind was pushing onto the backs of the riders and not blowing into their faces.

Since 1985 Art has led a yearly weekend to Cape Schank National Park. Walkers spend Friday and Saturday in the former Highfields homestead with beds, hot showers and indoor cooking facilities. There are long walks in the Green Bush area, walks along ocean cliffs and time for surfing and swimming in rock pools.

Art wrote articles for our Club magazine "Walk". "Recipe for a good walk" appeared in 1967, "Long dry out" in 1967, "Bicycle touring or sit down running" in 1980 and "Pedal power" in 1985. Art was on the Club Committee during 1969, 1972, 1981 and 1982.

I have pleasure in nominating Art Terry as a life member of Melbourne Bushwalkers.

Lilo Derbys were a notable event in the past (about 20 years ago) on the Lerderberg River. That's never deep enough these days so the Moorabool pools will be our new venue. The Derby Mug, er Cup, will be presented to the lilo rider who is fastest / driest / most competent at handling his/her steed under pressure, or whatever the judges decide is a good idea at the time.

There will be short walks up the Moorabool River from just north of Maude to a large waterhole. The easier walk will be along the ridge top on the eastern side. The easy/medium walk will be along the river side for part of its length where the vegetation is a little thicker and some rock hopping is required. There are plenty of koalas in the area. The last time I previewed for a walk up the river, one koala crossed the road in front of my car while another pair grunted (male) and squealed (female) while mating in the lower branches of a gum tree.

We hope to reach the waterhole early in the afternoon. The bus will be as close by as possible so that lilos only need to be carried a short distance. The waterhole is long enough and wide enough for everyone.

BUSHWALKERS REQUIRED FOR EXPLORATION!

The Australian and New Zealand Scientific Exploration Society (ANZES) is a non-profit organisation formed with the aim of launching scientifically oriented expeditions into wilderness areas of Australia.

The research undertaken encompasses various fields of science, including ornithology, botany, geology and zoology. During the expeditions data is gathered on behalf of many research and educational institutions including CSIRO and National Parks and Wildlife Services.

No scientific experience is necessary to take part in expeditions, although some experience in the bush is an advantage. Qualified scientists lead each Science group and work with expeditioners to exchange knowledge in the field. ANZSES particularly values the experience of bushwalkers, who are most welcome on their expeditions.

ANZES is launching an open-aged expedition into the **Desert Wetlands of northern South Australia** from **20 September to 9 October 1993**. They are now recruiting people to participate in this expedition to explore this unique area. The Cooper Creek floods in recent years have given rise to rich and varied communities of plants and animals. The desert is at its best: from waterholes teeming with life to sand dunes dotted with flowering Acacias. Against a background of vast horizons, spinifex

clumps and wind-patterned dunes, spectacular bird populations make their homes in stretches of inland lake wilderness.

Highlights of the 1992 expedition to this area included the recording of hundreds of aboriginal artefacts (including burial sites), observation of 52 brolgas (some dancing!) and watching fairy martins building their mud nests just a few metres from the camp site.

Expeditioners pay a fee which covers 4WD transport from the rendezvous point, tentage, food and equipment.

ANZSES will also be running a youth expedition (for 17-25 year olds) into North Queensland rainforest from 13 December 1993 - 13 January 1994.

THE PRESIDENT'S WEEKEND - HUGHES CREEK 12-13 DEC 1992

I reckon we're jolly lucky having such an energetic President as Jean Giese. Presidents gave up the traditional big production weekend years ago as the number of weekend walkers dropped off. Undaunted, our Jean organised a cast of 1000s, or so it seemed. She plotted the area, sought permission from the numerous land owners, roped in walk leaders, organised food to be bought and brought in, ditto plonk, and even a Tilly Lamp arrived and as stage lighting it was indispensable. Then there were teams of choppers and makers for the nibbles and fruit salad for the Saturday night. And what a fruit salad, murder was about to be committed for second helpings. Then again there was a team who got together the makings of arvo tea on the Sunday. A mammoth effort, brilliant organisation that ran like clockwork.

Mind you, there was a bit of a sweat on beforehand as Hughes Creek ran at flood level on and off for weeks. It is impassable then and many of our walks crossed it. But no, Jean must have a friend up there, it was just right, easy enough to cross but deep enough to find swimming holes which were much in demand on the Saturday.

About ten people made their way in on the Friday night across the paddocks and over the hill to the river flat on Crown Land. Jean chose a good spot with a sandy patch where a fire could be lit and the natural amphitheatre behind meant that the sandy bit was the stage for the evening production.

Some more of us rolled in early on Saturday morning and two walks left the campsite a bit later. Both crossed the creek and went straight up onto the Callen Range opposite. This is open woodland and several spring flowers were still very much in evidence. But it was hot. My team walked north along the ridge a fair way then dropped down a spur for a way. And there was Hughes Creek merrily burbling away far below us with a long steep slope covered in slippery grass between us, and the sun beating mercilessly down. You've never seen people strip off so fast and jump in when at last we got to the bottom, except for Wendy, who with agonised yells struggled to undo her shoe laces; they'd got all knotted up with the burrs and grass seeds. The other group didn't fare so well. They omitted to take a right turn on the Callen Range and headed due east instead of north (ho hum) and then got themselves in deep and tangled grass on Wicket Hill. It made walking most unpleasant and we subsequently abandoned plans for going into that area next day. So they, the hard group, got back before the easy group and were positively smirking and making comments like "Where have *you* been?" just because we looked exhausted. At least we were clean.

That night was the concert. This is definitely a Bushies tradition and people were fore-warned to have an item up their sleeves. A newcomer, American David, brought his guitar along. "What shall I play? I can play you anything," he says, breaking into another blues, or was it Country & Western number. The audience was well-primed by this time and dare I say some members were getting positively a bit rowdy, but they were sufficiently sat upon during the more serious moments. Then we had some wonderful recitations - from Geoff Mattingley, from Stuart Hodgson doing a faithful rendition of Albert and the Lion in broad Lancashire, from Dave Andrews and from Derrick Brown who gave us the Ballad of Idwal Slabs. All terrific stirring stuff. Then the highlight came when George, accompanied by David, gave us a Flamenco Dance. I really haven't laughed so much in ages, he was superb, he got masses of hand-clapping and Olé encouragement from the audience, and for our pains we were invited to join in the encore. No troubs there, lots of helpers. We could have done with a sing-song too, but alas the leading voices were absent, they'd better make sure they come next time. The evening ended with games, much falling over in the sand and shrieking.

Next day loomed dark, colder and gloomy. Just as some of us struggled out of bed and into breakfast, up rolled the day walkers from the bus ready for lunch. Oops then the rain fell. Never mind, it made a change from dehydration. Jopie led the more difficult walk. Up onto the Callen Range and off the other side to follow the beautiful Eaglevale Creek which enters a small and delightful gorge before it joins Hughes Creek. I took the middling group down stream to the cliff area, then we went up one side of it onto the ridge which we followed back staying high and keeping to the woodlands as much as possible. The easy walkers followed the creek down a bit and then back all the way to the waiting bus; very pretty it was they said. So those who were left congregated for that very welcome cup of tea, piece of excellent fruit cake and piece of fruit.

One ancient member tells me he thinks it was one of the very best President's Weekends he'd ever been on, the way how Jean involved the Sunday walkers, the Saturday walkers, the Wednesday walkers as well as the weekend walkers by campaigning hard and choosing an area not so far from Melbourne to make it accessible to all.

Good on ya, Jean, we had a terrific time, we enjoyed it so much. Will you do it again? Please?

TIN MINE HUTS, KOSCIUSKO N.P. (Private Xmas trip)

We set out from Melbourne about midday Monday 4 January; destination Geehi for an overnight stop and then Dead Horse Gap for 4 days of walking in the Tin Mine Huts area. We arrived at Geehi after dark to be confronted with gravelled carparks, paved, riverside walking tracks and treated pine viewing platforms over the river; all very different from last time.

After leisurely last minute (hours) sorting of walking gear in the morning we set out from Dead Horse Gap at 12.39. In the first 2 km along the Thredbo River we saw a group of 5 horses and one foal; very auspicious. They were quite unconcerned, grazing between the track and the river about 70 m down the slope. A pleasant lunch spot where the track leaves the river and up the hill (200m climb) to spectacular views back over the Ramsheads and south over the Park into Victoria. Climbed up the nearby rocky outcrop (1800+m) for even better views. Down to Cascade Creek (300m descent) to Cascade Hut and our resting spot for the night, 8 km total - a very easy day. We shared the hut area with a young girl on her first overnight walk with her father - the next generation.

Just as we were leaving in the morning we were descended upon by four mountain bike riders - fast, flashy and noisy. The next leg of 16 km to Tin Mine Huts undulates its way from 1500m to around 1200m. Lots of wildflowers including some orchids; plenty of birdlife - robins, wattlebirds, bush pigeons, currawongs, kookaburras and of course crows; a number of interesting lizards; and of course a lot of insects - flies, ants, March flies, mosquitoes. We arrived at Tin Mine Huts in time to see a display of head wind flying from a group of swallows. At different times they were almost stationary, in mid-air, only a few feet from where we were quietly seated.

We ended up sharing the huts area with a bush-walking couple from the Wangaratta area. An evening walk down the Ingeegoodbee trail found two groups of horses - 3 mares and 1 foal, and 5 mares and 1 foal. The foal in the second group was very young - still slightly wobbly and not grazing. Overnight the horses came in amongst the tents and huts. A nocturnal ramble was greeted with explosive snorts, echoing off the surrounding trees, and some intimidatory behaviour - the horses obviously felt they owned the night-time.

Next morning all four of us, Wangaratta couple included, set out to find Tin Mine Falls. They had carried in the full guide book by a well known

walker which recommended approaching the falls from travelling west from the gauging station (CMA Thredbo map 1:25,000) then north. Of the two guide books I had read, one suggested west from a point on the track 1 km south of the gauging station, then north; the other suggested start well north, go west then come back south to the falls. So we set out heading roughly north-west from the gauging station. This was a mistake. After 2 hours stomping around, finding various interesting lizards, a 45 cm copperhead, and the top of the falls (from which you can't see much at all), we found the "official" viewing spot and a 3 ft tiger snake. Great view, well worth it. To get back we simply headed straight, grid east and came out on top of the gauging station in 20 minutes - much simpler!

A short side trip to look at the site of the diggings - not much to be seen by the uneducated eye - and back to camp for the night. No horses tonight but sounds of howling dogs in the distance. The horses may have been deterred by the all-night candle of the Sydney bushwalker who was disturbed by the dogs.

The 24 km walk out on the next day was largely uneventful walking through pleasant country. The last 4 km were much degraded by an excess of Nat Parks vehicles - three 4WDs, a tipper truck and a bulldozer.

I am now sitting here with an upset stomach caused either by drinking suspect water on the walk or by the eating of overrich Christmas leftovers on return, pondering the logistics of a ski trip to the area: If there is skiable snow at 1200m the Dead Horse Gap road will be inaccessible. How do you get reliable snow reports on remote areas? etc...
