CONSERVATION MATTERS - ALPINE RESORT EXPANSION

Following is a summary of an article from the September VNPA newsletter regarding expansion plans which have been uncovered by recent VNPA research for almost all Victorian alpine resorts.

These plans include:

- Expansion of the Baw Baw Alpine Resort into a wilderness area within Baw Baw National Park. The LCC is proposing that Neulyne Plain be developed for downhill skiing after recommending in 1991 that it be protected from all development. The Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR) recognises Neulyne Plain as an area of national botanical and global zoological significance.
- A ski lift is planned to extend into the Alpine National Park at Falls Creek. This includes a lift near Rocky Valley Dam and a 1.5 km lift towards Mt McKay through untouched areas to the west of Frying Pan Spur.
- The Alpine Resorts Commission (ARC) plans for Mt Hotham Alpine Resort have the potential to double the size of the ski field by expanding into untouched terrain to the east of Swindlers Creek.
- Speculation is rife that plans exist for Mt Stirling. The ARC released a development strategy in 1989 and it is believed that the Grollo family is keen to pursue the project which included linking Stirling with Mt Buller via an aerial gondola.
- According to recent media reports, a luxury 18 hole golf course, commercial airport and international hotel are planned for Dinner Plain.

At present the ARC is only required to seek the comments of the DCNR for works above 1220 metres within alpine resorts. The ARC, which promotes alpine resorts is currently also the body which approves activities within them.

They want an environmental audit of all Victorian alpine resorts under the control of the ARC.

An independent public inquiry into measures to be taken to ensure the future ecological and economic sustainability of Victoria's alpine resorts.

Measures Required

The VNPA is now publicly calling a moratorium on resort expansion until the following issues are addressed:

An amendment to Section 66(1) of the Conservation, Forests and Lands Act to strengthen the powers of the DCNR to allow them to approve and, if necessary, veto any works within resorts considered to have unacceptable impacts on land, water, flora and fauna. The DCNR is the principle land manager in Victoria and the Alps and has the appropriate expertise to provide final judgements on proposed works.

FEDERATION OF VICTORIAN WALKING CLUBS - DRAFT CONSERVATION POLICY

The following extracts are taken from the Draft Conservation Policy drawn up by the Federation's Conservation Sub-Committee to be endorsed by the Federation early next year. The Policy in full is pinned to the Conservation News board in the Club rooms.

They are inviting comments from member clubs by 30 November, so if anyone is interested in contributing their ideas they should be directed to our Federation conservation representative, Ron Garrett.

Forests

Federation is against the replacement of Native Forests with Pine Plantations on public land.

Remaining rainforest and old growth forest which are not already contained in national parks or wilderness areas are to be protected in reserves and preserved for the future.

Although the Code of Forest Practices for Timber Production needs review, Federation in general terms supports this document. However breaches of the Code are not penalised sufficiently for effective protection of land, flora and fauna.

Fire

Fuel reduction burning is an extremely complex mechanism used extensively to reduce the cost of fighting bushfires. Much research is now going on and CNR are not using this technique indiscriminately as they have done in the past.

We are opposed to inappropriate methods of fire protection. More sensitivity should be shown in the construction of fire breaks and in the effect on the ecology of areas where fuel reduction burning is planned. More research is needed to find alternatives.

Camping and Campsites

When walking in remote areas and camping away from designated camping areas, members should look for low impact campsites; sandy or hard surfaces are better than boggy or grassed areas. Camp should be made at an existing campsite rather than a new one if possible. Sites should be at least 30 m away from watercourses and used for only one or two nights. Bushwalkers should aim to leave campsites the same as when they arrived, or in better condition if there is evidence of previous careless users.

Modern tents normally have their own poles or hoops which lessens the need to use local timber, and because they have sewn in floors, there is rarely the need for drainage trenches.

Many areas are designated as fuel stove only; bushwalkers should familiarise themselves with these areas. Wherever possible, use portable fuel stoves for cooking. No campfires should be lit in snow gum areas (approx 1200 m elevation). Small social fires are acceptable in less sensitive areas. Bushwalkers need to be aware that even dead timber lying on the ground can be some creatures' habitat and all is part of the ecosystem.

Reference Zones

Location of Reference Zones should be made known to club executives. Club leaders should be made aware of reference zones and trips and plan to avoid them.

Rivers and Streams

Federation is against interference with natural watercourses. In particular we oppose dams on Heritage Rivers or the diversion of large volumes of water for industrial purposes.

Spaghnum moss beds and wetlands must be avoided. Always wash at least 100 m away from streams or lakes and scatter the used washing water so that it will be filtered on its way back to the watercourse. Avoid the use of soap and detergents

Flora and Fauna

Our aim is the conservation and protection of all native flora and fauna, and in particular, threatened and endangered species. We are prepared to compromise our activities as bushwalkers in the interest of preserving habitat of species.

We support the eradication of introduced plants and feral animals. Boots should be washed and sterilised after each walk and seed gaiters worn where necessary.

Trail Bikes

Use of these is incompatible with bushwalking. They should not be permitted on walking tracks and should not be permitted to go off-road.

Litter/Waste

Federation encourages members to plan trips which minimise rubbish generation. Where possible avoid excessive packaging of bottles, tins and aluminium foil. Carry out all rubbish, namely plastic wrappers, aluminium foil, tea bags, orange peel, cans and bottles. If possible, clean up waste left behind by other inconsiderate bush users.

Wilderness

<u>Definition of Wilderness:</u> Land without permanent improvements, structures or human habitation that offers an opportunity for solitude and a challenging, primitive kind of experience, and where the forces of nature predominate.

All wilderness areas should be protected by Act of Parliament. The Act should be flexible enough to permit areas with wilderness qualities, but which bear the marks of human works to be admitted as wilderness, and to direct CNR to implement programmes that permit natural rehabilitation to occur.

Minimum Impact

Federation suggests that a maximum number of walkers to be 30 on day walks, and 12 on overnight walks. However, certain environmental conditions can make smaller parties desirable.

A policy of keeping to the track in sensitive areas should be adopted.

The Colo is a lovely river in the Northern Blue Mountains flowing through a gorge lined with lots of nice high cliffs, sandy beaches and with several interesting tributaries. It is a series of long pools separated by rapids. In the summer the weather is often warm making it ideal for a leisurely lilo trip with lots of swimming. Wollangambe Creek is the easiest and warmest of the Blue Mountains canyons and very spectacular.

I am intending to spend 4 or 5 days on the Colo and a full day on the Wollangambe. It is about 850 km to our first night's camp, a full day's drive, but the area is well worth it.

Everyone must be able to swim and will have to have a buoyancy vest and a helmet of some sort (like the canoeists) for safety when shooting rapids on the Colo. There will be a group limit of 12.

The Gammon Ranges and the Mawson Plateau are two tough, rough but spectacular features of the Northern Flinders Ranges. The Gammons have a magnificent series of very rugged and remote gorges which I partly explored over 15 years ago and I'm itching to get back and do the area properly on a 5 day pack carry. Water can be a problem in the Gammons and April is a good month because the waterholes are more likely to have water from summer storms than later in the season.

The Mawson Plateau is an elevated granite landscape with permanent waterholes, a rare feature in the Flinders. It is north of Arkaroola. The photos I have seen look terribly attractive. I want to explore it on a 4 day pack carry involving a 3 night base camp on the plateau.

The average maximum termperature in April is 24.8 which should mean mostly OK conditions with the possibility of an occasional warm to hot day. After all this we will have the option of returning straight home or spending two extra days in the Southern Flinders doing day walks to Edeowie Gorge and the Yappala Range. The only question mark on the trip is that if they have a drought in the Gammons we may have to cancel the trip due to lack of water there, but we should know at least 2 months ahead.


