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NOTICE OF EXTRAORDINARY GENERAL MEETING

WEDNESDAY 8.00 P.M. 6 OCTOBER 1983

An Extraordinary General Meeting of the Melbourne Bushwalkers (Inc.) will be held in the Club rooms on Wednesday 6 October at 8.00 p.m.

The only business of the meeting will be to pass a **Special Resolution** to amend the Club's Statement of Purposes and Rules (the Constitution) to satisfy the requirements of the Australian Taxation Office in the event of the winding up of the Club (see explanation below).

Rule 25 Delete "In the event of the winding up or cancellation of the incorporation of the Association, the assets of the Association shall be disposed of in accordance with the provisions of the Act."

Insert "If upon the winding up or dissolution of the Association there remains, after satisfaction of all its debts and liabilities, any property whatsoever, the same shall not be paid to or distributed among the members of the Association but shall be given or transferred to some other organisation having similar objects to the Association and which shall prohibit the distribution of its income and property amongst its members to an extent at least as great as it imposed on the Association."

<u>Proxy</u> Should any member wish to vote by proxy he or she may do so by completing and signing the form on page 12 which must be received by the Secretary before the commencement of the meeting.

Explanation

The time of year had arrived in July for the Club to apply to the Tax Office for exemption from income tax. This was required to stop deduction of tax at the source on interest paid to the Club and also for our bulk mailing of "News". The Tax Office advised that we could be considered exempt provided our Rules are amended to prohibit distribution of assets among members in the event of the winding-up or dissolution of the Club. As set out above, our Rules require disposal of assets in accordance with the Associations Incorporations Act. Section 35 of that Act says the assets shall be disposed of in accordance with a special resolution passed by the Association, or - if no special resolution and where the Rules of the Association do not otherwise provide - be divided amongst the members in equal shares.

Obviously, the Tax Office is not going to exempt us from tax if we can wind up the Club and share out the assets between ourselves. We do not see any likelihood of the Club being wound up by ourselves or forced on us by the Registrar of the Office of Incorporations, but we do want tax exemption - so we have to change the Rules in the way the Tax Office suggests. We have used the words set out by the Tax Office.

PRESIDENT'S PAGE

Central Highlands National Park Project

At the half yearly general meeting our members voted overwhelmingly to give the sum of \$4566 from our surplus to the Victorian National Parks Association for a specific project aimed at persuading the Land Conservation Council and the Australian Heritage Committee to extend the proposed park to include key areas of high value for conservation and bushwalking and provide linking corridors for fauna with Melbourne Water catchment areas.

Your Committee recommended this project to members as the Central Highlands Park covers areas where many of our day walks take place and to have the park extended as proposed would be to our advantage as walkers as well as ensuring the conservation issues involved.

The Club (and also individual members) had earlier made submissions to the LCC along these lines. The VNPA now sees a real possibility of influencing the LCC's decision if it can be demonstrated that the timber values are less important than currently claimed by the timber industry. This requires scientific research, using some information already obtained by volunteers and preparing a report on selected areas, listing both the conservation values and the timber values.

This is a significant decision by the Club and one which we trust will protect larger areas for future bushwalking and which is also in line with the second of MBW (Inc)'s purposes, i.e. "to encourage an appreciation of the wild life and natural beauty of this country and to assist in its preservation."

CONSERVATION MATTERS

SAVE GREENS BUSH AGAIN!

Reprinted below is an article from "Environment Victoria" regarding Greens Bush which is now part of the Nepean National Park as a result of a \$13-million buy-back fund in 1988 to which we donated \$200.

Those of you who are aware of the area should voice your concerns by writing to the mentioned authorities.

Greens Bush is under threat again, says Les Smith, Secretary, Conservation Council of Victoria. This area of great beauty and biodiversity became part of the Nepean National Park on the Mornington Peninsula, after the northern part was saved from sub-division in 1988 through a \$13-million buyback funded by public donations and the Government.

But the values of this area, much of it in pristine condition, are under serious threat from a pony club / equestrian centre. It straddles the head waters of a creek which runs down into the Park and is enclosed on three sides by the park.

Cinnamon fungus, deadly to many native trees and shrubs, particularly where water is present, is killing grass trees in the equestrian area. Exotic grasses are being introduced, partly through the use of hay to stabilise sandy tracks. It is feared both will be carried downstream (with other pollutants) to devastate the Park's fern gullies.

Many conservation groups have tackled the problem but without success so far. Flinders Shire Council's draft management plan is vague and omits many recommendations made by a consultant.

You can help by writing to the Shire of Flinders, PO Box 1000, Rosebud, 3939, and the Minister of Planning, Rod MacLellan, the Minister of Conservation and Natural Resources, Mark Birrell, and the Minister for Local Government, Roger Hallam.

We'll hire a taxi/mini-bus at Jindabyne on the Sunday morning to get us to the start at Kiandra and from the finish at Guthega (or Munyang). The total taxi fares will be about \$50-60 each for six or more.

From Kiandra we climb up past Mt Selwyn and along an undulating ridge before descending to Happy Jacks. Then it's a long arc over The Mailbox, The Cup and Saucer to Mawsons and the Kerries. There'll be time for a detour to that mecca of ski-tourers, Jagungal. The Kerries and The Brassys will provide ample opportunity for exploring infrequently visited places including that airy eerie, Gungartan, perched high above the Munwang to Jagungal "trade-route". Given good weather (particularly visibility) we'll descend to Shlink Pass, quickly cross the trade-route and romp off over the Rolling Grounds via Dicky Cooper Bogong to Conset Stephen Pass.

With ever lightening packs, it's up and either over or around Mts Tate, Anderson and Anton to Twynam. Twynam, it its setting of glacial cirques, lakes and cliffs is the start of the Main Range proper. Some say Twynam even forms a mini-glacier in winter but I don't like to repeat such speciulations. It's then a long hoot down off Twynam to the foot-bridge across the Snowy River and Guthega. If we have any spare time (!?) we'll fill in along the Main Range or some of the lovely gullies around the back of The Perisher and The Paralyser.

There is a caveat on all this. When the advance preview was written in June there was an excellent snow base everywhere, but as at mid-August, this has long since disappeared in the northern section. If this still looks like being the case at the time we will abandon the Kiandra to Mawson walking bit and start from Munyang or Guthega. By base camping at Island Bend we'll have the option for a 3 or 4 day trip around the Kerries/Brassys/Rolling Grounds plus other day trips as per above. So we can't lose, whatever eventuates a good time will be had.

This is the traditional end of season ski trip, it's part walking, part skiing. The days are (... well, can be) long and sunny, the snow firm and reliable (... well, in the morning). Generally, we drive to Dead Horse Gap and carry all our gear up into the Ramsheads until we wither strike the snow-line or the tree-line. This has the advantage that if the weather turns foul (as it well and truly did about 1 a.m. on the Monday morning last year) it's only an hour downhill back to the cars. It also avoids the tent city that springs up around Club Lake Creek and sometimes the old site of Rawson's hut.

I like the rocky crags and intricate little gullies around the Ramsheads, the spectacular view across into Victoria and down the Thredbo valley. The main disadvantage is that to get to Kossie or Townsend or the Main Range the same snow has to be traversed each day. If the party is keen then we could go further in the Ramsheads or even the Wilkinson valley. Fortunately parties aren't generally that keen. If the snow looks poor around the Ramsheads then we might relocate via Thredbo or the Charlotte's Pass side (but definitely not to Tent City). We'll make a decision on the day from Dead Horse Gap.

This four day walk will cover a range of high plains and valley environments.

Starting at Hotham, our route will be along the Razorback to Feathertop, the West Kiewa Valley, Fainters via the West Ridge (which looks "interesting"), the Bogong High Plains to High Plains Creek, Young's Hut, the Cobungra Valley and Swindlers Spur to Mt Loch. Various optional side trips can be arranged.

MAJOR MITCHELL PLATEAU OR FOURTH TIME LUCKY

All week the Weather Bureau had been forecasting a change to bad weather later in the week, and both Gina and I posed the rhetorical question, "Do we have to go?" We did as my husband was the leader.

This was to be our fourth attempt to see Major Mitchell Plateau not covered in dense fog as it was in 1984, 1990 and 1991. Doug had first been there in 1962 with Fred Halls one sunny Easter, and had not really seen it again since then.

Friday night brought the squalls promised, but we drove through them to a wet noisy campsite at Jimmys Creek, via slippery muddy roads at the end - Ken MacMahon, Doug and I, Derrick and Gina, that is. Max, Ralph and John Markham camped nearby and our two beginner weekenders, Tony and Joe, overnighted in a caravan at Halls Gap.

The rain held off and, after a very short car shuffle, we headed fairly steeply up Jimmy Creek track to the Plateau, keeping an eye on the weather. As ever, the Grampians were beautiful: both the bush we walked through and the views, as we climbed, of the escarpments around. The early spring flowers were beginning to bloom and Doug, Ken and I had a field day spotting new plants.

We lunched just below the edge of the Plateau at a lookout, then pushed on to the top. As we crossed the Plateau to the small campsite, it began to rain briefly. Unfortunately the site was occupied by a large school group and, although they politely moved over, half our party of ten camped elsewhere. Highlights of the campsite are the

picturesque little creek running through it and an outdoor composting toilet half way up a hill and reached by steep stone steps.

We had a little rain overnight and woke to a cool morning. We got moving early and soon dropped steeply off the Plateau, then up again to the rather exposed Mount William, with its lovely sub-alpine flora. We admired Major Mitchell and his crew in retrospect (although *they* had no choice) for their fortitude in spending a night here without shelter or provisions.

After viewing the monument to Major Mitchell next to the large ugly aerials at the top of Mount William, we walked down the steep tarred road to a delightful track which gently took us back to Derrick's car, with lunch in the sun at a creek along the way.

Doug and I were delighted to have completed the trip in good weather, with visibility. Three other old hands, Ken, John and Max, were pleased to have at last got to the Plateau, Ken declaring it a classic walk. Our new weekenders, starting their careers with a medium grade walk, finished enthused about both weekend walking and the Grampians.

It was a great weekend, full of variety, although ending as it had begun with trip back to Melbourne through driving rain.

On our way to the Grampians last month we called in to Craigs Hotel at Ballarat for an evening meal. We have eaten there before and it is not the cheapest of eateries, but it has always been good. We were not disappointed this time either.

The hotel has a history, having been built in the gold rush days, and has been visited by many famous personages. The dining room displays splendid ceiling friezes and has a long bar with a counter made from a single piece of wood. It was not crowded and was still serving meals at 8.30 p.m.

My entrée was a sea-food pancake, delicious! Being a carnivore, about to undergo the rigours of a meatless Saturday night up on Major Mitchell Plateau, my main course was beef rib. It was the largest piece of meat that I've seen on a plate outside a butcher's shop. Though it may come as a surprise to some, I must confess that it beat me. Less of a surprise perhaps, my wife, who cannot allow a plate to return to the kitchen unless absolutely clean, cleared it. The waiter took away two clean plates and a bone. Coffee and mints completed the meal for me, but if you have any room left, the desserts are a real treat. Highly recommended!
