From the President

It has been several years since I last walked at Wilsons Prom. I was there the other weekend, doing the Prom in a day. What a great place it is - that coastline, the beaches, the ferns and mosses. I was not particularly thrilled with the Tidal river campsite with its (relatively) crowded camping areas, but the others are wonderful. What a relief that the majority of the proposed developments have been knocked back. The thought of a hotel and associated services made my blood run cold. We can be grateful to all those who put themselves out to protest at the proposals that this time the protesters We have seen a number of substantial won. developments proposed in the last year or so in Victoria. As one of the largest bushwalking clubs we should be vigilant and active if we want to protect the environment from development encroachment. You may have noticed that in the last newsletter there was a notice that a Conservation sub committee be formed. Metzenthen currently carries the load and he could do with some help. How about it?

Regarding the possible move of clubrooms to South Melbourne we've carried out a survey of members and visitors visiting the clubrooms, on two occasions. The first results (37 responses) gave us an even split in favour and against. When the results were weighted to account for frequency of visits there was no change. The second set of responses gave a similar result. I must emphasise that at present this is only one option, and that we still do not know if we do have to move. However, after a thorough search for suitable premises it seems clear that there are not many options open to us. Stay tuned.



9-11 May 1997 Mt Buller Lodge Weekend Easy/Medium and Hard

Once you get away from the buildings and ski tows, Mt Buller offers some surprisingly good walks. few are excellent.

I have arranged for us to have the Melbourne Walking Club Lodge on Mt Buller for the weekend. This is one of the newer lodges on the mountain and sleeps 16 people in bunkrooms. I expect that most people will want to do the Easy/Medium trip which Max Casley has volunteered to lead. People doing Max's walks will drive to the lodge on Friday evening and do the walk from Mt Stirling to Mt Buller on Saturday. On Sunday, the tradition has been to walk to Little Buller and visit the summit of Mt Buller. If a car shuffle can be arranged, a walk down the Klingsporn track could complete the day.

I will lead a hard walk which will start by climbing Mt Timbertop after a car shuffle on Saturday morning. We will then follow the ridge and ascend Mt Buller from the south-west. On Sunday we will have a slightly easier day, descending to Mirrimbah via Mt Stirling.

Both groups will spend Saturday night in the lodge. It is usual to go to one of the restaurants or the pub for dinner, but cooking facilities are available in the lodge for those who prefer. Bring your own food for breakfasts and lunches.

You will need to bring a pillow slip and sheets or sleeping bag. You will also need to bring your towel, toilet soap, etc. The lodge fees are \$20 for each night you spend in the lodge. The Melbourne Walking Club wants to know the numbers as soon as possible, so please book and pay your lodge fees now.

16-18 May 1997 Mt Cole-Mt Buangor State Park Easy/Medium

This walk was cancelled last year due to poor response from members and bad weather conditions. Let's hope we have better luck this time.

Mt Cole - Mt Buangor is about 3 hours north west of Melbourne. We will meet Friday night at the Fern Tree Picnic camp ground.

Day 1. Distance approx. 14kms.

We will take the Freemans Link track and head up to Mugwamp picnic ground & camping area, enroute passing a high point at 951m, which will provide excellent views. From Mugwamp picnic area we will walk along the Mt Buangor walking track. As we will be above 900m we will get good views along the cliff face. The walk will continue south along the Wallaby Cave Road before heading back to camp. If time permits, we will explore the Wallaby cave and its nearby granite outcrops.

Day 2. Distance approx. 12kms.

We will start with the Freemans Link track and turn east to the Great Divide walking track. The Sugarloaf look out at 934m should give us good views of the surroundings. From here we will do a circuit walk from Upper Level walking track to Lower Level walking track, before heading back to camp.

Both walks will involve some steep climbing on rocks. You'll need to be fairly fit but you will be rewarded by the magnificent view. Come join me, it will be a fun weekend.

Letter to the editor:

As most Bushies are probably aware by now the Assessment and Review Panel report on the environmental effects statement for the Mt Stirling Alpine Resort has just been released.

The panel found 'that the Options which include downhill skiing on Mount Stirling should be eliminated from further deliberations about the future of Mount Stirling'. The reasons were set out in the report and are quite detailed.

The panel were also very concerned about the low esteem in which the Alpine Resorts Commission were held by their 'clients'. This doesn't surprise me nor, most likely, anyone involved in the 'Saga of Wilky' who were aware of the ARC role there despite the ARC having no jurisdiction on the High-Plains.

In a covering letter (December '96) for the report from the Minister for Planning and Environment (Robert Maclellan) to the Minister for Conservation and Land Management (Marie Tehan) Mr Maclellan wrote, in response to 2 of the Panel recommendations:-

Panel:

- Government make a clear statement that Mount Stirling is no longer an option for downhill alpine skiing
- Government make a clear statement that the future vision for Mount Stirling is as an all season nature based tourist, recreational and educational resource.

Minister's assessment:

'Endorsed. It is appropriate that such a statement should be prepared and made by the Minister for Conservation and Land Management who is responsible for the Alpine Resorts Act. It is further recommended that the Victorian Government's earlier approval of the Land Conservation Council Recommendations in relation to downhill skiing on Mt Stirling be revoked.'

In February '97 the Minister issued a supplementary response to these 2 questions which was:- 'Mount Stirling will not be an option for downhill skiing for the next 15 years. Any change to this position beyond 15 years must be the result of a further government review process. In view of this, it is not necessary to revoke the agreed LCC Recommendation for Mount Stirling to be used for downhill alpine skiing: the approved LCC Recommendation will have no force for the next 15 years, nor thereafter unless a further review leads to a new Government decision.

The Government's future vision for Mount Stirling is as an all season nature based tourist, recreational and educational resource.' This is no longer the same thing. The recommendation has been watered down and I'm not sure what binding validity the 15 year prohibition has. There were other changes between December and February, many related to not spending money, but this is the most worrying as it no longer revokes the approval for the LCC recommendations on the development of Mt Stirling.

So Bushies, congratulations on your contributions to the excellent outcome on Mt Stirling - let's just keep vigilant for when Mt Buller Ski Lifts Ltd want to have another go (with your money and a little of theirs) ... the LCC recommendations haven't been revoked.

"If you go up on the top", he said, "the wind will take you away It has blown less than thirty knots to be safe on any day."


Back up the track was harder work as we puffed and panted and groaned But a most amazing sight we beheld as we stepped on to the road.
