

There should be plenty of wildflowers, maybe a few koalas, historical ruins (Jan's great grandfather was a mine manager here and her grandfather opened his first tailors shop here). All in all a very pleasant walk.

This will be a Saturday morning start 9.30 at Anakie Gorge Picnic Area.

12-14 September 1997	Razorback

This is one of the best ski trips in Victoria. We start at Diamantina Hut on the Mt Hotham road and ski along the Razorback to camp near the top of the Champian Spur, then head towards Mt Feathertop with day packs. There are steep open slopes, and runs through trees, lots of ups and downs and fabulous views. However, in unfavourable conditions it can be about the most dangerous ski tour in Victoria. If it's icy, bad weather, or no snow we'll try somewhere else in the Hotham area.

Participants need to be experienced skiers and snow campers. There is no water at the camp site, so bring enough fuel to melt snow. No fires allowed.

12-14 September 1997	Pyrenees Walking Track

The JaJowarrong Aborigines occupied the Pyrenees prior to the European's arrival in the 1840's. Their

name for the area was Peerick. Gold was discovered in 1854 and there are relics of the, mainly, Chinese and Cornish people's activities in the way of mines, Chinese gardens and slate quarries. The footpaths of Collins St, were paved with Percydale slate until 1960.

I'm not sure yet whether we will be mainly on the Pyrenees walking track, which was completed in 1991, or whether we choose a different route. It depends if there is enough water in the creeks for our camping needs.

We will be in undulating country, elevation 350m to 750m, with some steep, hilly sections and superb views. The wildflowers should be out, the nights will be cold and the walking pace will be easy.

To begin with this walk is super spectacular so don't forget the camera. We begin at Troopers Creek car park, do a steep climb to Mt Difficult and take in some magnificent views, weather permitting. We will then follow the cliff line north towards Briggs Bluff. Camp will be made just south of Briggs Bluff around the various tributaries of Deep Creek. Next morning we will bag Briggs Bluff and then head north down towards Baker Gap Car Park. From here we will return to Troopers Creek via the road.

This area has some lovely water falls and caves, so there is plenty to see and explore. Note the ridge is mostly cliff and rock slab walking so some agility is required.

26-28 September 1997	Grampians

The Grampians (Gariwerd) are world renowned for their flora. On this trip we will do some leisurely walks giving plenty of time to admire and identify some of the wonderful plants photographers welcome.

At this stage we haven't decided which campsite to use but it will be in the Northern Section. This is an opportunity for people to try camping if they haven't yet done so. Being close to the cars means a few luxuries may be carried (it may be deemed mandatory to share goodies with the leader - by law 24 c ii)

CONSERVATION FORUM

The long awaited management plans for the Wilson's Prom National Park have been released. I think that the plans are very disappointing, basically disgusting. The salient features of the "plan" are:-

- A 45 bed privately owned set of cabins at Tidal River; a lodge to built near Halfway Hut on the lighthouse track; the commercialisation of the lighthouse buildings.
- A track to be cut through the wilderness between Waterloo Bay and the lighthouse.
- An expansion of the "development area" at Tidal River (where the private cabins will be located).
- A vaguely defined thing called "A Centre of Excellence" just inside the park boundary at Yanakie.

The details have not been released (possibly because they are still being negotiated with a favoured operator and/or made up on the run as the process goes along) but it is likely that there will be a commercial operator selected and given a long term (99 year?) lease option. It should be a very profitable venture for the favoured and lucky operator given the exclusive and unique settings. It seems that the main driving force for the new track through the southern wilderness to the lighthouse is to provide a circuit between the commercial lodgings. I would have no objection to the lighthouse site being operated on either a public or private commercial basis, given restrictions that the development be in keeping with the historic nature of the site. That would be one way to preserve it. But to develop additional commercial sites at Tidal River, Waterloo Bay and Halfway Hut with linking tracks to


make it a viable commercial proposition is inconsistent with the wilderness values in that part of the national park.

Doug Humann of the Vic. National Parks Assoc. (VNPA.) summarised it quite well, and to quote Doug: "The decision to allow such developments also ignores strong public sentiment that parks are for nature conservation. The state government has learnt nothing from the community outcry which erupted last year [over The Prom]". Elsewhere he wrote, "The Premier abandoned the 150 bed lodge/hotel [at Tidal River] not because it was inappropriate for a national park, but because it was not commercially viable".

I think that the later point is the essential factor in whether proposed developments succeed to the point of supporting legislation being forced through parliament. It was most certainly true of Mt Stirling. development at Mt Stirling was, at best, dodgy. There was no way that the downhill resort could have been commercially viable as a development (let alone the operation of the resort, but that's a different and separate issue) without an enormous subsidy in the form of publicly funded infrastructure development AND a free handout of public land to the developer as freehold titles. It sounds the same at The Prom except that leasehold will be substituted for freehold. The Yanakie "Centre of Excellence" could be developed as a commercial venture outside the nearby park boundary, on private land, without compromising the integrity of a national park.

The Club supported the VNPA. "Hands of The Prom" campaign with a donation from the Club's special account. That donation was clearly a wise investment as the battle continues. It looks to me that our parliamentary representatives need a big stick tacking to them to reinforce the "Hands Off The Prom" message. The best stick is a threat to the electoral majorities of individual seats if the views of the 45,000 petitions and 3237 submissions already sent in are further ignored. Now that the "plans" have been released we can focus on its inadequacies. I hope to be able to give details of the Club's response in the next 'News'.
