HALF YEARLY GENERAL MEETING

THIS YEAR WALK IS GOING TO BE FINANCIALLY UNSUCCESSFUL. This has been attributed chiefly to our distribution. Currently we employ the firm Gordon and Gotch to distribute our magazine for us. Gordon and Gotch take a fixed percentage of the sales price but due to increased production costs we are now selling WALK at a loss. Rex Filson proposed that for future issues Club members may take say 20 copies each and hand them around the country. Several of the older hands pointed out that this was the original method of distribution; was unsuccessful and the Club therefore moved to G & G. Much discussions followed and it was resolved that Rex Filson approach G & G and discuss the problem with them before we decide a course of action for 1968.

ALONG THE TRACKNo snow walk??

Neil's snow walk had almost everything - except snow. Leaving the van at the top of Blacks Spur, we split into two parties, Spencer leading one, and Neil the comparative newcomers.

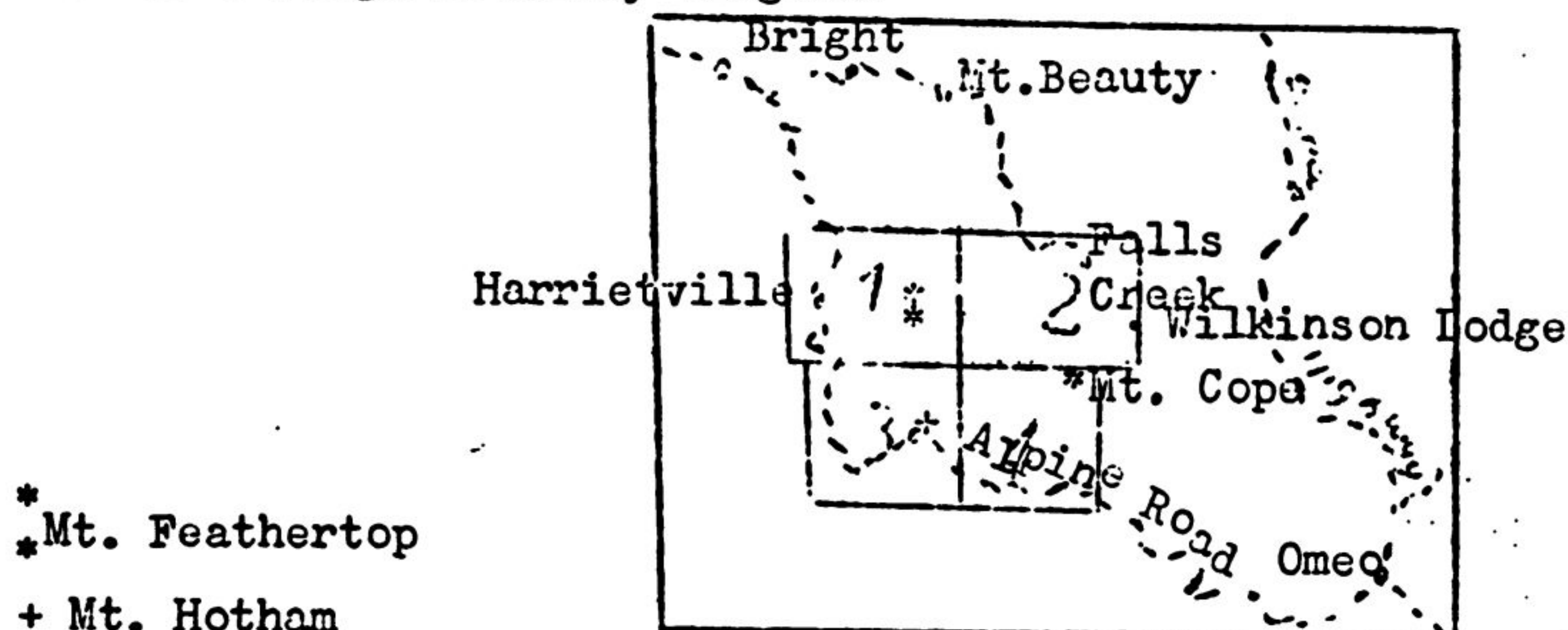

NEW MAPS

At last! The Lands Dept. have produced another 4 colour topographic map. The first for 2 years. It is the much fabled Hotham and Falls Creek Alpine Area and its now available at the Central Plan Office in the Treasury buildings. It is at a scale of 4 inches = 1 mile and consists of 4 sheets at 50c per sheet. The areas of interest to bushwalkers are :-

- Sheet 1 - Mt. Heathertop and approaches
Sheet 2 - Falls Creek ski village, Bogong High Plains (Wilkinson Lodge is 330 yards east of the eastern sheet edge, so is not shown), Mt. Fainter and the Niggerheads.
Sheet 3 - Mt. Hotham and environs Mt. Loch, and Machinery Spur.
Sheet 4 - Dibbins Hut, Young Hut and Mt. Cope.

EXTRACT FROM A RECENT WALKS REPORT

"... It was a cold, dark night. The rain poured down. The emergency rations were almost gone. Would the party make it back to Melbourne? The leader looked again at his old sketch map of the area, but someone must have moved a mountain. This was the last stage of the whole fiasco and by now the party all knew that the leader had not planned the trip with the aid of the club map file."

If you don't want this to happen to you, read on:

WHY WE HAVE A MAP FILE

The two main reasons are:

- 1) To help members in planning walks;
- 2) To enable leaders especially to check all the available maps covering the area of their walk.

HOW TO USE THE CLUB MAP FILE

- 1) The map file is situated in the filing cabinet in the clubroom. If the filing cabinet is not open, ask the map custodian (Cranky Charlie) or the Secretary (Sweet Sue) or the Duty Officer (if you can catch one) to open it for you.
- 2) The maps are in folders arranged in the same order as listed in the map index. The numbers are based on the old Army inch to the mile system. (See key map accompanying map index.)
- 3) If you know the general area you will be able to find the file number from this key. If you only have the name of a creek or mountain, consult the alphabetical index on Broadbent's 100 miles around Melbourne or the alphabetical index in the Federation Map Index.
- 4) In each folder you will find maps covering this area and also cross reference cards if there are maps in other folders which also cover part of this area.
- 5) You can take maps out of the folders and study them in the clubroom. MAPS MUST NOT BE REMOVED FROM THE CLUBROOM. When you have finished with the maps, please be sure to return them to the correct folder. Each map has the folder number written on the back.
- 6) If you need any help, please see the map custodian. He can explain the filing system to you and can answer your general queries about maps (e.g. where to buy, etc.).
